Every person riding an animal or driving any animal-drawn vehicle upon a roadway shall be granted all
of the rights and shall be subject to all of the
duties applicable to the driver of a vehicle by this
chapter, except those provisions of this chapter
which by their very nature have no application.

Sec. 3. 29 MRSA §941-A is enacted to read:

15 §941-A. Obedience to and required traffic-control devices

The driver of any vehicle shall obey the instructions of any official traffic-control device, applicable thereto placed in accordance with this chapter, unless otherwise directed by a police officer, subject to the exceptions granted the driver of an authorized emergency vehicle in this chapter.

No provision of this chapter for which official traffic-control devices are required may be enforced against an alleged violator if, at the time and place of the alleged violation, an official device is not in proper position and sufficiently visible to be seen by an ordinarily observant person.

Whenever official traffic-control devices are placed in position approximately conforming to the requirements of this chapter, these devices shall be presumed to have been so placed by the official act or direction of lawful authority, unless the contrary is established by competent evidence.

Any official traffic-control device placed pursuant to this chapter and purporting to conform to the lawful requirements pertaining to these devices

- shall be presumed to comply with the requirements of this chapter, unless the contrary is established by competent evidence.

 Sec. 4. 29 MRSA §944-B is enacted to read:

 §944-B. Right-of-way; vehicle turning left
- The driver of a vehicle intending to turn to the left within an intersection or into an alley, private road or driveway shall yield the right-of-way to any vehicle approaching from the opposite direction which is within the intersection or so close to the intersection as to constitute an immediate hazard.
