ful completion of a driver education course and examination given by some person or persons licensed by the Secretary of State. No license shall be required of certified teachers conducting a driver education course in public secondary schools or academies receiving tuition students as described in Title 20, section 1291. All licenses expire on December 31st of the year of issue.

Successful course completion certificates may be issued to any person permitted by law to have a license provided such course, given by the public secondary schools and academies receiving tuition students as described in Title 20, section 1291, shall meet teacher qualification, course content and standards approved by the State Board of Education. Successful course completion certificates shall not be issued to any person who was not at least 15 years of age at the commencement of the driver education course.

After September 1, 1977, no No motorcycle motor driven cycle learner's permit or permission or restriction to operate a motorcycle or motor driven cycle shall may be issued to any person under 17 years of age, unless such that person shall present presents a certificate of successful completion of a motorcycle driver education course and examination given by the public secondary schools and academies receiving tuition students, as described in Title 20, section 1291; or certificate of successful completion of a motorcycle driver education course and examinagiven by a public secondary school or academy including a demonstration of ability to safely operate a motorcycle; or certificate of successful completion of a driver education course and examination given by some person or persons licensed by the Secretary of State Commissioner of Business Regulalicense shall may be required of certified teachers conducting a motorcycle driver education in public secondary schools or academies receiving tuition students, as described in Title 20, section 1291. All licenses expire on December 31st of the year of issue.

Any person between the ages of 15 and 17, who satisfies the Secretary of State that no readily

available means of transportation exists to and from a secondary school or academy which he is attending, may be issued, upon passing the regular driver's examination as provided in section 581, a special permit authorizing such person to drive to and from such school or academy.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to require training in safe motorcycle operation as a prerequisite for license to operate a motorcycle. The bill will also correct errors and inconsistencies in the current law. Present practices authorize legal motorcycle operation for persons with no instruction designed to train him to operate a motorcycle skillfully and as safely as possible. The differences in characteristics require understanding for safe operation of motorcycles that aid in avoiding crashes and protect them and their passengers in crashes.

Enactment of this bill should have a substantial impact upon the number of deaths and injuries now incurred by inexperienced motorcycle operators.

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
