- 6 Any nuclear civil protection program in the State that is a program to protect the civilian population from the effects of nuclear weapons shall be subject 8 9 to this section.
- 1. Public hearings. Prior to December 31, 1984, 2 public hearings shall be conducted in each of the 10 11 12 following 8 designated risk areas in the State:
- 13 Category I (areas associated counterforce military installations): Limestone 14 (Loring Air Force Base) Risk Area; York 15 16 (Kittery-Portsmouth Naval Shipyard) Risk Area;
- 17 B. Category II (location of installations of 18 high military value): Cutler; Brunswick-Bath;
- 19 C. Category III (urban-industrial areas): Portland; Bangor; Lewiston-Auburn; and 20
- 21 D. Category IV (center of government): Augusta.
- The first public hearing shall be designed to provide 22 23 information on: The nuclear civil protection plan, including both the crisis-relocation plan and the 24 in-place shelter plan; the rationale for the plan; 25 alternatives to the plan; the process of accepting, 26 27 implementing and funding the plan; the immediate and long range effects (including social, economic, medi-28 cal and psychological effects) of a nuclear attack on 29 30 the target area and on the State. Written informa-31 tional materials shall be available at the hearing.
- 32 The 2nd public hearing shall be designed to hear the views of citizens on the nuclear civil protection 33 plan. It shall be held within 30 days of the first 34 hearing. At the end of the 2nd hearing a nonbinding 35 poll shall be taken of the citizens present as 36
- 37 whether they agree or disagree with the proposed
- nuclear civil protection plan. 38

The hearings shall be held in a convenient, central location at a convenient time in the evening.

Reasonable notice shall be given, including, but not limited to, publication in local and general circulation newspapers in target and host communities at least 20 but not more than 30 days prior to each hearing.

- 2. Citizens' commission. The Citizens' Commission to Evaluate Nuclear Civil Protection is established. The commission shall consist of 14 members, to be evenly divided between men and women, as follows: Ten members by the Governor, 2 members by the President of the Senate and 2 members by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The Governor's appointees shall include: An educator, a youth representative, a physician, a social worker, a mental health worker, a nurse, a staff person from the Bureau of Civil Emergency Preparedness and 3 members of bona fide civic organizations active in the public discussion of this issue. Two members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be members of the House of Representatives. Two members by the President of the Senate shall be appointed members of the Senate.
- 25 The commission shall conduct the public hearings required by subsection 1; approve the informational 26 materials required for the hearing to assure all 27 28 points of view are represented; publicize the hearings; review the material presented at the hearings, 29 30 including public comments and the polling results; and report to the Governor, the Legislature and each 31 community within the target zone its findings and 32 recommendations following each series of hearings and 33 34 at other times as appropriate.
- Committee members shall be compensated for travel expenses to and from all commission meetings and hearings at the same rate as state employees.
 - 3. Approval. Any nuclear civil protection plan, which has not been approved by the State, county or municipality prior to January 1, 1983, shall not be approved until after the public hearings and the report of the commission on that area. Any nuclear civil protection plan, which has been approved prior

- to January 1, 1983, may be reconsidered and modified, or approval may be withdrawn, based on the hearings and report.
 - Sec. 3. Finding. The Legislature finds that plans are being developed to prepare for a nuclear attack on the State; that many Maine residents are not aware of the plans and have not had adequate opportunity to question and comment on the plans; and that such plans may be ineffective and inappropriate.
- Sec. 4. Expenses; Bureau of Civil Emergency
 Preparedness. The Director of the Bureau of Civil
 Emergency Preparedness shall utilize funds made
 available to the bureau through the Federal Emergency
 Management Agency to carry out the purposes of this
 Act.

16 STATEMENT OF FACT

 This bill requires specific minimum standards for educating the public about the impact of a nuclear attack on the State and about the plans being developed to prepare for such an event. The effectiveness of the plans and the views of Maine citizens must also be addressed. Public hearings are required, and the Citizens' Commission to Evaluate Nuclear Civil Protection is established to report to the Governor and the Legislature.
