- 28 §2151. Creation and membership

A Seed Potato Board, as heretefere established in the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources, shall consist of the commissioner and 6 8 additional members appointed by him. Of the 6 8 appointed members, 5 7 shall be chosen from representatives of the potato industry in Aroostook County and one from elsewhere in the State of Maine, provided that one appointed member shall be primarily a table stock producer and one primarily a processor producer.

1 Sec. 4. 7 MRSA §2152, first ¶, as repealed and 2 replaced by PL 1971, c. 594, §9, is amended to read:

Each appointed member shall serve for a term of 3 years or until his successor has been appointed and qualified, except that no member may serve for more than 3 consecutive terms.

The Seed Potato Board shall have the power and authority to produce, or cause to be produced through contract or otherwise, such acreages of foundation seed potatoes of various varieties as it may from time to time determine for distribution and sale to the potato growers of this State. Said The commitments of said the board shall not exceed in the of aggregate the amount funds which may be made available to it. In addition, the board shall be advisory to and shall have authority to work with and through the Maine Agricultural Experiment Station of the University of Maine and other public and private agencies, in conducting and carrying on a program of production of foundation seed potatoes annually. Said The board shall have authority to purchase, own or otherwise acquire farm real estate and farm equipment if necessary for the purpose of producing ages of foundation seed potatoes or providing for the testing thereof, and any salable material resulting from such the ownership or operation may be sold to best advantage of the board. The board shall have authority to sell or otherwise convey farm real estate and farm equipment no longer required for the purposes of this chapter. Proceeds from such the sale shall be credited to the operating account of

the board.

The board shall have the responsibility and full power and authority to make, in a manner consistent with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, and regulations not inconsistent with law pertaining to its program of production, distribution and sales foundation seed potatoes to the potato growers of Maine the State, as it may from time to time deterincluding, but not limited to, long-range projections of industry trends and needs, contracting with growers to reproduce nuclear seed stock normally grown at the state seed potato farm, determination of the varieties and volume of seed to be grown at the state seed potato farm, allocation of seed to growers for the benefit of the entire state potato industry, development of a standardized commercial seed testing program for new varieties, if no such procedure exists under the auspices of the Maine Agricultural Experiment Station, and to exercise any other power which may be conferred upon the board by law.

The board is authorized to pay to the Town of Masardis in lieu of taxes a sum, in the discretion of the board, which will compensate said the town in whole or in part for loss of real estate taxes due to state ownership of real estate now used for seed potato purposes.

Sec. 7. 7 MRSA §2155, as amended by PL 1971, c. 594, §10, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

§2155. Records and proceedings

1. Administration. The Seed Potato Board shall elect a secretary, who need not be a member of the board, and the commissioner shall have authority to employ a managing director and such agents as may be necessary, subject to the Personnel Law, to consummate any and all programs which it may institute, as authorized under the terms of this chapter and shall keep a record of all of its proceedings, and all expenses by it incurred shall be paid out of the State Treasury, on certification of the commissioner, upon the audit and warrant of the State Controller and charged against any and all appropriations which

- 1 may be annually made available for its use as stipu-2 lated.
- 3 2. Program plan. The managing director shall present to the board, at least annually, a program 4 5 plan for the board's consideration and specific ac-6 tion, which plan shall include an assessment of the 7 seed potato industry, a projection of demand for seed by variety in the various marketing areas, the impact 8 9 of significant changes in seed potato acreage, the 10 capital needs of the state seed potato farm, considering current and future technology, proposals to 11 12 improve the varieties and quality of Maine seed potatoes, recommendations to promote the sale of Maine 13 14 seed, and to other such matters the managing director 15 deems appropriate.

- 18 CONTROL AND ERADICATION OF POTATO PESTS AND DISEASES
- 19 §2351. Legislative intent
- The Legislature finds that the potato industry contributes significantly to the social and economic well-being of the people of the State and that the control and eradication of pests and diseases which threaten the viability of the industry must remain a high priority in the formulation of public policy.
- 26 §2352. Responsibility of the commissioner
- 27 The commissioner may institute such pest control 28 survey programs as he deems essential to the welfare of the industry. He may, in conjunction with the 29 30 Maine Agricultural Experiment Station, and other 31 public and private agencies, and in a manner consist-32 ent with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, 33 Title 5, chapter 375, designate by rule those potato pests and diseases which pose a threat to the Maine 34 35 potato industry, and by rule provide for the inspection, seizure, destruction or other deposition of any seed, plant, culls or other materials within the 36 37 38 State whenever he finds such materials 39 infested, or are reasonably believed to be infested,

with any designated pest or disease, and further provide for the disinfection of any vehicle or other conveyance so infested.

STATEMENT OF FACT

In 1980, the Farm Credit Service, a major creditor of the state potato industry, completed a comprehensive industry analysis. Based on this, the industry developed a Potato Industry Long-Range Plan (1982-1986). The industry's willingness to address long-term change (versus short-term benefits) is essential to the survival of an industry facing serious production and marketing problems.

Much of the plan is concerned with seed potatoes. The production of quality seed is the basis of much of the needed improvement in the industry.

The intent of this bill is to implement the recommendations of the Potato Industry Long-Range Plan to strengthen the state's certified seed potato program, by providing for changes in the membership of the Seed Potato Board, increasing board responsibility and authority, clarifying the disease control authority of the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources, and requesting funding to carry out the major recommendations.

Section 1 creates a so-called "flush out" system to assure the availability of new foundation seed on an ongoing basis, and provides for the designation of "certified seed potato production areas" within the State.

Section 2 specifies violations.

Sections 3, 4 and 5 provide for increased membership on the Seed Potato Board, adding table stock and processor growers.

Section 6 directs the board to act in an advisory capacity to certain agencies, to assume specific responsibilities with regard to variety determination, allocation of seed, commercial testing and long-range planning.

Section 7 provides for a managing director, who shall present, annually, a program plan for the board's consideration and action.

Section 8 grants the commissioner greater authority for potato pest and disease surveillance and control.

Funding for this bill (\$75,000 for both fiscal years 1984-1985) is included in the Governor's Part II Budget and will provide for pest and disease control and eradication, enforcement of the statutory requirement that only certified seed be planted and help carry out the surveillance program for seed potatoes imported from areas suspected of infestation.
