17 18 19	AN ACT to Create a Forest Resource Assessment and Marketing Program.
20 21	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
22	Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §5106 is enacted to read:
23 24	§5106. Forest Resource Assessment and Marketing Pro- gram
25	There is created within the Department of Conser-
26	vation a Forest Resource Assessment and Market Pro-
27	gram for the purpose of receiving, processing and
28	analyzing data provided by the United States Forest
29	Service Decennial Forest Resurvey and establishing
30	marketing and utilization programs to address the
31	needs and opportunities presented by the resurvey
32	data, including, but not limited to, developing
33	expanded export markets, encouraging increased use of

1 underutilized species, promoting in-state secondary 2 and value-added processing of Maine wood and paper 3 products and pursuing additional markets for fuel 4 wood and fuel wood chips.

5 Sec. 2. Evaluation and termination. The depart-6 ment shall report to the First Regular Session of the 7 ll2th Legislature as to the success of this program 8 which shall terminate at the end of fiscal year 1985 9 unless reenacted by the Legislature.

## STATEMENT OF FACT

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The United States Department of Agriculture,
Forest Service is nearing completion of its decennial
statewide forest resurvey.

14 The survey will identify the current status of 15 the forest resource throughout the State, including 16 total biomass and traditional merchantable volumes by 17 species, forest type and region. Knowledgeable pro-18 fessionals are predicting that the results of this 19 resurvey will indicate significant changes in the 20 availability of merchantable forest volumes through-21 out the State as a result of increased harvesting and 22 the depredations of the spruce budworm in the last 23 decade.

The State has invested \$400,000 in this program to assure comprehensive data collection, which will be of value to public and private resource managers in the State.

28 The resurvey data now must be carefully and 29 intensively analyzed to identify new opportunities for the utilization of currently underutilized spe-30 cies and sizes of trees. Enhancing the Department of 31 32 Conservation's ability to analyze and interpret the 33 resurvey data will allow the department to identify 34 and respond to key utilization and marketing opportunities. 35

36 It is anticipated that the data will generate 37 possibilities for initiatives which are not within 38 the traditional marketing and utilization strategies. 39 This bill provides an infusion of public support to 1 begin to take advantage of these new opportunities.

Funding for this bill is contained in the Governor's Part II budget recommendations: \$147,000 in fiscal year 1984 and \$148,000 in fiscal year 1985. The recommendation includes Personal Services at \$57,000 and \$58,000, respectively. An annual appropriation of \$90,000 is recommended for All Other. Two staff positions are created.

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
