In the that actual revenue fails to equal estimates during either year of the biennium, the commissioner shall so report to the Governor and he may temporarily cur-10 tail allotments so that expenditures will not the anticipated income.

Revenue in excess of estimates. revenue, in excess of that estimated and approved by the Legislature, received in either year of the biennium may be utilized by the department for current programs when recommended by the commissioner and the allotment of these funds is approved by the Governor.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect July 1, 1983, except that section 2 to 11 of this Act shall become effective on January 1, 1984.

STATEMENT OF FACT

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39 40 The Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife is a dedicated revenue department which is largely dependent on license fees to fund fish and wildlife law enforcement, management and research programs.

The most recent adjustment in fees on general hunting and fishing licenses became effective on January 1, 1980. Since that time, high inflation rates and employee pay raises mandated by collective bargaining agreements have increased the annual operating expenses of the department from less than 7 million dollars to approximately 9 million dollars.

The license fee changes proposed in this new draft will increase department revenues by approximately 1.9 million dollars annually and will enable the department to continue to provide current services.

license fee increases contained in this new draft shall permit the department to increase the number of district wardens employed by the department bring the total number of permanent, full-time game wardens to 126 and to maintain that number. is the intent of this new draft that that number maintained by expending the revenue received from the license fee increases contained in this new draft first for that purpose. It is the expressed intent this new draft that no funds received by the department from the fee increases contained in new draft be expended to increase the number of employees, employed on the effective date of this new draft in any other division, bureau or section of the department until the aforementioned increase in the number of district wardens is accomplished. increased fees are expressly intended to be expended first to improve enforcement of inland fisheries and wildlife laws.
