- 1. License required. It shall be unlawful for any person to use a boat for dragging for scallops unless that boat carries a boat scallop license issued by the commissioner.
- 6 <u>2. Licensed activity. A boat licensed under</u> 7 this section may be used for dragging for scallops.
- 8 Sec. 3. 12 MRSA §6954, sub-§1, as enacted by PL 1983, c. 179, §2, is amended to read:
 - 1. Violation. It is unlawful to use any drag or trawl along the seabed in any waters that are identified or marked as underwater cable or pipeline areas, either as shown on the most recently published United States Government nautical chart, or as shown or described by rule adopted by the commissioner. The commissioner may make rules showing or describing the locations of underwater cables or pipelines which are not identified on the most recent United States Government nautical charts.

20 STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill establishes a requirement that boats dragging for scallops be licensed by the Commissioner of Marine Resources. In the First Regular Session of 111th Legislature, legislation was enacted which was intended to lessen the incidence of dragging scallops and fish by fishing boats in the vicinity of submerged electric cables, Public Law 1983, chapter 179. The law now provides that the license which authorized the individual to engage in the fishing tivity at the time of violation shall be suspended. Recent experience demonstrates that the effectiveness of the law is compromised by the fact the the boat itself is not removed from the fishery and that owners, knowing that good fishing may exist in the a cable, may place a new operator aboard with instructions to fish the cable area. The additional boat license requirement will prevent the circumvention of the law and the intent behind it.

This bill also provides a procedure for protecting underwater cables which may not be shown on nautical charts by authorizing the commissioner to adopt rules, in accordance with the requirements of the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, the Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 375, by which notice would be given of locations of uncharted cables. Destruction of these cables by means of dragging would be prohibited.
