13 14 15 16 17 18	This bill establishes a wage-based formula for determining cost-of-living increases for retired state employees and retired teachers. Prior to 1977, retired state employees and teachers received the same percentage increases as state employees whenever the Legislature enacted a general wage increase for state employees.
20 21 22	Present law grants retired state employees an increase based upon rises in the Consumer Price Index, but such raises are capped at a 4% maximum.
23 24 25 26 27	This bill establishes a wage-based formula to be determined by averaging wage increases earned by state workers and teachers for the preceding year. In order to allow enough time to elapse to establish the percentage based on wage increases, the cost-of-living raise for 1984 will be set at 5%
