21 22 23	Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legis- lature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
24 25 26	Whereas, unemployment is a serious and persistent problem in the state economy and is expected to average in excess of 9% for 1983; and
27 28 29 30	Whereas, significant structural changes are underway in the economy which will accelerate the displacement of workers and overturn traditional work patterns; and
31 32 33	Whereas, the problems of underemployment, part- time employment and inadequate wages are growing in this transitional economy; and

Whereas, unemployment and underemployment deprive the State and its communities of the full supply of goods and services, full utilization of labor and capital resources and the related increases in economic well-being; and

Whereas, workers are deprived of job security, income, skill development and productivity necessary to maintain and advance their standard of living; and

Whereas, business and industry are deprived of the production, sales, capital flow and productivity necessary to maintain adequate profits, undertake new investment, create jobs and contribute to meeting society's economic needs; and

Whereas, unemployment exposes many families to social, psychological and physiological costs, including disruption of family life, loss of individual dignity and self-respect, and the aggrevation of physical and psychological illnesses, alcoholism and drug abuse, crime and social conflicts; and

Whereas, the state and local governments are undermined by deficits due to shortfalls in tax revenues and increases in expenditures for unemployment compensation, public assistance and other recession-related services in the areas of criminal justice, alcoholism and drug abuse, physical and mental health; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 26 MRSA c. 23 is enacted to read:

It is declared to be the policy of the State to use all practicable means consistent with its needs and obligations and other essential state policies, and with the assistance and cooperation of both small and large business, agriculture, labor and local governments, to coordinate and utilize all its plans, functions and resources for the purpose of creating and maintaining conditions which promote useful employment at fair compensation for those able, willing and seeking to work. It is recognized that the State has and continues to suffer from substantial unemployment and underemployment imposing numerous social and economic costs which would not occur under conditions of genuine full employment.

#### §1751. Commission established

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There is established a Special Select Commission on Employment to investigate the problems and consequences of unemployment and make recommendations for creating and maintaining useful employment at fair compensation for those able, willing and seeking to work and more effectively protect unemployed workers from the serious social and economic consequences of unemployment. The commission's inquiry shall include, but not be limited to, considerations of the state's investments, subsidies, guarantees and contracting and purchasing powers as a direct means of creating employment. Further inquiry shall be rected into public administration of the production of those socially necessary goods and services not adequately produced or provided by the private sector. It shall further determine geographic areas of the State and profiles of its residents who suffer most severely from unemployment.

1 The commission shall be appointed by the Presi-2 dent of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Repre-3 sentatives and shall include 15 members composed as 4 follows: Three representatives of organized labor; 3 representatives of business and industry; 3 Legisla-5 6 tors; 2 representatives of consumers; one representa-7 tive of state agriculture; the Commissioner of Labor; the Director of the Finance Authority of Maine; and a 8 9 representative from the State Planning Office. The 10 commission shall be comprised equally of men and wom-

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# SUBCHAPTER II

#### PUBLIC SERVICE EMPLOYMENT

#### 17 §1755. Purpose

It is the purpose of this subchapter to provide unemployed and underemployed persons eligible for services under the Job Training Partnership Act with transitional employment in jobs providing needed public services which are otherwise unavailable wherever feasible related training and manpower services to enable those persons to move into employment or training not supported under this subchapter.

#### §1756. Utilization of funds

Funds available under this subchapter shall be administered by the Department of Labor, in accordance with rules promulgated by the commissioner and utilized to subsidize full-time employment for a period not to exceed an average of 6 months in length with any eligible public or private nonprofit employer. Not less than 95% of funds appropriated pursuant this subchapter shall be expended only for wages and employment benefits to persons employed in public service jobs pursuant to this subchapter.

37 §1757. Assurances and labor standards Any contract with an employer receiving an employment subsidy under this subchapter shall include the following provisions:

- 1. Funds not to be used to fill openings created by termination of employment. No funds received under this subchapter may be used to hire any person to fill a job opening created by the action of an employer in laying off or terminating the employment of any regular employee not supported under this subchapter in anticipation of filling the vacancy so created by hiring an employee to be supported under this subchapter;
- 2. Wages comparable to those paid for similar occupations. The wages or salaries, benefits and conditions of employment to be provided persons employed in public service jobs under this subchapter shall be comparable to the wages paid for similar public occupations by the same employer;
- 3. Infringed upon promotional opportunities. The jobs in each job category in no way infringe upon the promotional opportunities which would otherwise be available to persons currently employed in public service jobs not subsidized under this subchapter, and assurances that no job will be filled in other than an entry level position in each job category until applicable personnel procedures and collective bargaining agreements have been complied with; and
- 4. Funded jobs to be in addition to those funded by employer. Jobs funded under this subchapter are in addition to those that would be funded by the employer in the absence of assistance under this chapter.

### §1758. Enforcement

The Commissioner of Labor shall monitor and enforce compliance with the requirements of this subchapter, including all contracts executed thereunder, and impose sanctions on any employer found to be in noncompliance. Sanctions shall include, but not be limited to, recovery of the value of subsidized employment provided to that employer.

20	STATEMENT OF FACT
21 22 23 24 25 26 27 28 29	Unemployment has been and continues to be a serious and persistent problem in the state economy, this year expected to average in excess of 9%. This problem is accelerating because of significant and fundamental changes in the nature of our present manufacturing economy. Unemployment deprives the State of a full supply of goods and services, full utilization of its labor force and capital and related increases in economic well-being.
30 31 32	This bill provides the following initiatives to promote the creation of employment and prevent the harsh consequences of unemployment:
33	1. Creates the Special Select Committee on Em-

ployment to study the problem of unemployment and offer recommendations to achieve the goal of greater employment opportunity for citizens of the State;

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- 2. Creates and appropriates funding for a state-funded public service employment program to be administered by the Department of Labor; and
- 3. Establishes a surtax on the corporate income tax and franchise tax on banking and loan companies, which triggers when unemployment exceeds 8%, to be used to create public service employment.

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
