1. Congregat	
means residenti	ial housing consisting of private

1 apartments and central dining facilities and within 2 which a congregate housing supportive services pro-3 gram serves functionally impaired elderly occupants 4 who are unable to live independently yet do not re-5 guire the constant supervision or intensive health 6 care available at intermediate care or skilled nurs-7 ing facilities.

8 2. Congregate housing services program. "Con-9 gregate housing services program" means a comprehen-10 sive program of supportive services, including meals, 11 housekeeping and chore assistance, personal care as-12 sistance, case management and other services which 13 are delivered in congregate housing and assist occu-14 pants to manage activities of daily living.

15 <u>3. Eligible elderly clients.</u> "Eligible elderly 16 clients" means an individual 60 years of age or over 17 who has been determined through an approved assess-18 ment by the Department of Human Services to be func-19 tionally impaired and in need of congregate housing 20 supportive services.

Sec. 3. 22 MRSA §5153, as enacted by PL 1979, c.
717, §1, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

24§5153. Administration of congregate housing services25programs

26 The Department of Human Services, Bureau of 27 Maine's Elderly, with advice from the Maine Committee 28 on Aging, shall administer state funded congregate 29 housing services programs for the elderly. Adminis-30 tration shall include, but not be limited to:

31 1. Rules; operations of congregate housing ser-32 vices programs. Promulgating and adopting rules gov-33 erning the operation of congregate housing services 34 programs;

 ^{2.} Compliance with standards and guidelines.
 Certifying and reviewing the compliance of congregate
 housing services programs with standards and guide lines established for the program; and

1 2 3	3. Awarding of grants. Awarding of grants, when available and necessary, to subsidize the cost of congregate housing services programs.
4	Sec. 4. 22 MRSA §5154 is enacted to read:
5 6	§5154. Certification of congregate housing services programs
7	The Department of Human Services, Bureau of
8	Maine's Elderly may promulgate and adopt rules relat-
9	ing to the certification of all congregate housing
10	services programs operating in the State, regardless
11	of their funding source. The rules shall include:
12	1. Certification standards and guidelines. Es-
13	tablishing standards and guidelines for certifica-
14	tion;
15	2. Decertification standards and guidelines.
16	Establishing standards and guidelines for decertifi-
17	cation;
18	3. Annual review. Conducting an annual review
19	of congregate housing services programs to determine
20	whether or not a certification should be awarded or
21	renewed;
22	4. Issuance of certificates. Issuing certifi-
23	cates to programs which meet the standards and guide-
24	lines; and
25	5. Informing consumers. Informing consumers of
26	programs which meet certification criteria and annu-
27	ally publishing a listing of all certified programs
28	operating in this State.
29	STATEMENT OF FACT
30	This bill makes congregate housing for the elder-
31	ly an on-going responsibility of the Department of
32	Human Services. In 1980 the Legislature created a
33	demonstration project to test the feasibility of con-
34	gregate housing and provided \$87,000 for 2 years to
35	provide funds for supportive services in 2 congregate
36	housing projects. With Maine State Housing Authority

1 and Farmers Home Administration, the Bureau of 2 Maine's Elderly awarded 2 projects, one in Farmington 3 (Ethel Walton House) and one in Portland (North 4 School).

5 That demonstration produced a 1981 report to the 6 Legislature which showed that:

7 1. Thirty-three elderly persons were receiving
8 congregate housing services at an average cost
9 which is lower than comparable boarding and nurs10 ing home costs;

2. Fifty percent of new residents in congregate
 housing demonstrations actually moved there from
 nursing or boarding homes or hospitals. The re maining 50% were at risk of institutionalization;
 and

16 3. Elderly report high satisfaction with the 17 program, as evidenced by long waiting lists; some 18 of whom now reside in institutions and wish to 19 move out.

20 This bill allows the Department of Human Services 21 to continue congregate housing programs, as funds are available, gives the Department of Human Services the 22 authority to certify all privately and publicly de-23 24 veloped programs for their compliance with program 25 rules. Certification allows consumers and their famto determine whether or not a congregate hous-26 ilies ing program meets the standards established by the 27 28 Department of Human Services.

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
