25	§8001. Department; agencies within department
26 27 28 29 30 31 32 33	There is created and established the Department of Business, Occupational and Professional Regula- tion, in this chapter referred to as the "depart- ment," to regulate financial institutions, insurance companies, commercial sports, grantors of consumer credit and to license and regulate professions and occupations. The department shall be composed of the following bureaus, boards and commissions:

5	OCCUPATIONAL THERAPISTS
6	§2271. Declaration of purpose
7 8 9 10 11 12 13 14 15 16	In order to safeguard the public health, safety and welfare, to protect the public from incompetent and unauthorized persons; to assure the highest de- gree of professional conduct on the part of occupa- tional therapists and occupational therapy assist- ants; and to assure the availability of occupational therapy services of high quality to persons in need of those services, it is the purpose of this chapter to provide for the regulation of persons offering oc- cupational therapy services.
17	§2272. Definitions
18 19 20	As used in this chapter, unless the context oth- erwise indicates, the following terms have the fol- lowing meanings.
21 22 23	<u>1. Board. "Board" means the Board of Occupa-</u> tional Therapy Practice established under this chap- ter.
24 25 26	2. Commissioner. "Commissioner" means the Com- missioner of Business, Occupational and Professional Regulation.
27 28 29	3. Department. "Department" means the Depart- ment of Business, Occupational and Professional Regu- lation.
30 31 32	4. Occupational therapist. "Occupational therapist" means a person licensed to practice occupation- al therapy under this chapter.
33 34 35	5. Occupational therapy. "Occupational therapy" means the evaluation, planning and implementation of a program of purposeful activities to develop or

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1 maintain adaptive skills necessary to achieve the maximal physical and mental functioning of the indi-2 vidual in his daily pursuits. The practice of "occu-3 4 pational therapy" includes, but is not limited to, 5 evaluation and treatment of individuals whose abili-6 ties to cope with the tasks of living are threatened 7 or impaired by developmental deficits, the aging pro-8 cess, learning disabilities, poverty and cultural 9 differences, physical injury or disease, psychological and social disabilities or anticipated dysfunc-10 11 tion, using:

- 12A. Treatment techniques as task-oriented activi-13ties to prevent or correct physical or emotional14deficits or to minimize the disabling effect of15these deficits in the life of the individual;
- 16 B. Evaluation techniques as assessment of 17 sensory motor abilities, assessment of the devel-18 opment of self-care activities and capacity for independence, assessment of the physical capacity 19 20 for prevocational and work tasks, assessment of 21 play and leisure performance and appraisal of 22 living areas for the handicapped; and

C. Specific occupational therapy techniques such 23 as activities of daily living skills, the fabri-24 25 cation and application of splinting devices, sensory motor activities, the use of specifically 26 designed manual and creative activities, guidance 27 in the selection and use of adaptive equipment, 28 specific exercises to enhance functional perform-29 ance and treatment techniques for physical capa-30 31 bilities for work activities.

- 32 The techniques are applied in the treatment of indi-33 vidual patients or clients, in groups or through so-34 cial systems.
- 6. Occupational therapy aide. "Occupational 35 therapy aide" means a person who assists in the prac-36 tice of occupational therapy under the direct on-site 37 38 supervision of an occupational therapist or occupa-39 tional therapy assistant and whose activities require 40 an understanding of occupational therapy, but do not require professional or advanced training in the ba-41 42 sic anatomical, biological, psychological and social

1 sciences involved in the practice of occupational 2 therapy.

7. Occupational therapy assistant. "Occupa-3 tional therapy assistant" means a person licensed to 4 5 assist in the practice of occupational therapy, under this chapter, who works under the supervision of 6 an 7 occupational therapist. 8 8. Person. "Person" means any individual, part-9 nership, unincorporated organization or corporation. 10 §2273. Board of Occupational Therapy Practice; es-11 tablishment; compensation 12 1. Establishment and membership. There is established within the Department of Business, Occupa-13 tional and Professional Regulation, a Board of Occu-14 15 pational Therapy Practice. The board shall consist of 5 members appointed by the Governor. The persons 16 17 appointed to the board must have been engaged in ren-18 dering occupational therapy services to the public, teaching or research in occupational therapy for at 19 least 2 years immediately preceding their appoint-20 21 ments. At least 3 board members shall be occupational therapists. One member shall be either an occupa-22 tional therapist or an occupational therapy assist-23 24 ant, if available. These members shall at all times be holders of valid licenses for the practice of oc-25 cupational therapy in the State, except for the mem-26 bers of the first board, all of whom shall fulfill the requirements for licensure of this chapter. The 27 28 remaining member shall be a member of a health pro-29 fession or member of the public with an interest in the rights of the consumers of health services. 30 31 2. Terms of appointment. The Governor, within 60 days following the effective date of this chapter, 32 33

34 shall appoint 2 board members for a term of one year, 35 2 for a term of 2 years and one for a term of 3 years. Appointments made thereafter shall be for 36 3-year terms, but no person may be appointed to serve 37 38 more than 2 consecutive terms. Terms shall begin on 39 first day of the calendar year and end on the the last day of the calendar year or until successors are 40 appointed, except for the first appointed members who 41 42 shall serve through the last calendar day of the year in which they are appointed, before commencing the terms prescribed by this section.

Any member of the board may be removed from office for cause by the Governor. A member may not serve more than 2 full successive terms, provided that, for this purpose only, a period actually served which exceeds 1/2 of the 3-year term shall be deemed a full term.

9 3. Meetings. The board shall meet during the 10 first month of each calendar year to select a chairman and for other purposes. At least one additional 11 12 meeting shall be held before the end of each calendar 13 year. Other meetings may be convened at the call of 14 the chairman or the written request of any 2 board 15 members. A majority of the members of the board shall constitute a quorum for all purposes. All 16 17 meetings of the board shall be open to the public, 18 except that the board may hold closed sessions for 19 license suspension, revocation or refusals to renew.

- 4. Compensation. Members of the board shall re ceive no compensation for their services, but shall
 be entitled to reasonable travel and other expenses
 incurred in the execution of their powers and duties.
- 24§2274. Board of occupational therapy practice; pow-25ers and duties

1. Powers. The board shall administer and enforce this chapter and evaluate the qualifications of applicants for licensure. The board may issue subpoenas, examine witnesses, administer oaths and may investigate or cause to be investigated any complaints made to it or any cases of noncompliance with or violation of this chapter.

33 2. Rules. The board may adopt, in accordance 34 with the Maine Adminstrative Procedure Act, Title 5, chapter 375, rules relating to professional conduct 35 to carry out the policy of this chapter, including, 36 37 but not limited to, rules relating to professional licensure and to the establishment of ethical stan-38 39 dards of practice for persons holding a license to 40 practice occupational therapy in this State.

1	3. Hearings. Hearings may be conducted by the
2	board to assist with investigations, to determine
3	whether grounds exist for suspension, revocation or
4	denial of a license, or as otherwise deemed necessary
5	to the fulfillment of its responsibilities under this
6	chapter.
7	4. Records. The board shall keep such records
8	and minutes as are necessary to the ordinary dispatch
9	of its functions.
10 11	5. Contracts. The board may enter into contracts to carry out its responsibilities under this chapter.
12	6. Reports. No later than August 1st of each
13	year, the board shall submit to the commissioner, for
14	the preceding fiscal year ending June 30th, its annu-
15	al report of its operations and financial position,
16	together with such comments and recommendations as
17	the commissioner deems essential.
18	§2275. Board of occupational therapy practice; ad-
19	ministrative provisions
20	1. Officers. The board shall appoint a secre-
21	tary and may appoint other officers as it deems nec-
22	essary.
23	2. Employees. With the advice of the board, the
24	commissioner may appoint, subject to the Personnel
25	Law, such employees as may be necessary to carry out
26	this chapter. Any person so employed shall be lo-
27	cated in the department and under the administrative
28	and supervisory direction of the commissioner.
29	3. Budget. The board shall submit to the com-
30	missioner its budgetary requirements in the same man-
31	ner as is provided in Title 5, section 1665.
32	§2276. License required
33	1. License required. No person may practice oc-
34	cupational therapy or hold himself out as an occupa-
35	tional therapist, or as being able to practice occu-
36	pational therapy or to render occupational therapy
37	services in this State, unless licensed under this
38	chapter.

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1 2	2. Individual license. Only an individual may be licensed under this chapter.
3	3. Penalty; injunction. A person who violates
4	any of the provisions of this chapter is guilty of a
5	Class E crime.
6	The State may bring an action in Superior Court
7	to enjoin any person from violating this chapter, re-
8	gardless of whether proceedings have been or may be
9	instituted in the Administrative Court or whether
10	criminal proceedings have been or may be instituted.
11	§2277. Persons and practices exempt
12	Nothing in this chapter may be construed as pre-
13	venting or restricting the practice, services or ac-
14	tivities of:
15 16 17	1. Licensed persons. Any person licensed in this State by any other law from engaging in the pro-fession or occupation for which he is licensed;
18 19 20 21 22 23	2. Students or trainees. Any person pursuing a supervised course of study leading to a degree or certificate in occupational therapy at an accredited or approved educational program, if the person is designated by a title which clearly indicates his status as a student or trainee;
24	3. Supervised fieldworkers. Any person fulfill-
25	ing the supervised fieldwork experience requirements
26	of section 2279, subsection 4, if the experience con-
27	stitutes a part of the experience necessary to meet
28	the requirement of that subsection;
29	4. Associates; reciprocity. Any person perform-
30	ing occupational therapy services in the State, if
31	these services are performed for no more than 30 days
32	in a calendar year in association with an occupation-
33	al therapist licensed under this chapter, if:
34	A. The person is licensed under the law of an-
35	other state which has licensure requirements
36	equivalent to the requirements of this chapter;
37	or

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B. The person meets the requirements for certi-1 2 fication as an Occupational Therapist Registered, OTR, or a Certified Occupational Therapy Assist-3 4 ant, COTA, established by the American Occupa-5 tional Therapy Association; or 6 5. Occupational therapy aides. Any person employed as an occupational therapy aide. 7 8 §2278. Temporary license A temporary license may be granted to a person 9 10 has completed the education and experience rewho 11 guirements of this chapter. This permit allows the person to practice occupational therapy in associa-tion with a licensed occupational therapist. This 12 13 14 permit is valid until the person is issued a license under section 2281 or 2282, or until the results of 15 the national exam taken by the person are available 16 17 to the board. This limited permit may be renewed one 18 time if the person has failed the examination. 19 §2279. Requirements for licensure 20 An applicant applying for a license as an occupa-21 tional therapist or as an occupational therapy assistant shall file a written application provided by 22 23 the board, showing to the satisfaction of the board that he meets the following requirements. 24 25 1. Residence. An applicant need not be a resident of this State. 26 27 2. Character. An applicant shall have demon-28 strated ethical practice. 29 3. Education. An applicant shall present evi-30 dence satisfactory to the board of having successfully completed the academic requirements of an 31 educa-32 tional program in occupational therapy recognized by 33 the board. 34 A. The occupational therapy educational program shall be accredited by the Committee on Allied 35 36 Health Education and Accreditation of the Ameri-37 can Medical Association in collaboration with the 38 American Occupational Therapy Association.

1	B. The occupational therapy assistant education-
2	al program shall be approved by the American Oc-
3	cupational Therapy Association.
4	4. Experience. An applicant shall submit to the
5	board evidence of having successfully completed a pe-
6	riod of supervised fieldwork experience arranged by
7	the recognized educational institution where he met
8	the academic requirements or by the nationally recog-
9	nized professional association.
10	A. For an occupational therapist, a minimum of 6
11	months of supervised fieldwork experience is re-
12	quired.
13	B. For an occupational therapy assistant, a min-
14	imum of 2 months of supervised fieldwork experi-
15	ence is required.
16	5. Examination. An applicant for licensure as
17	an occupational therapist or as an occupational
18	therapy assistant shall pass an examination as pro-
19	vided for in section 2280.
20	6. Licensure. An applicant may be licensed as
21	an occupational therapist if he has practiced as an
22	occupational therapy assistant for 4 years, has com-
23	pleted the requirements of subsection 4, paragraph A,
24	before January 1, 1988, and has passed the examina-
25	tion for occupational therapists.
26 27 28	§2280. Examination for licensure of occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants
29	1. Fees. Only a person satisfying the require-
30	ments of section 2279, subsections 1, 2, 3 and 4, may
31	apply for examination in such a manner as the board
32	shall prescribe. The application shall be accompa-
33	nied by the nonrefundable fee prescribed by section
34	2285. A person who fails an examination may apply
35	for reexamination upon payment of the prescribed fee.
36	2. Content. Each applicant for licensure shall
37	be examined by written examination to test his knowl-
38	edge of the basic and clinical sciences relating to
39	occupational therapy, occupational therapy techniques

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1 and methods and such other subjects as the board may 2 require to determine the applicant's fitness to prac-3 tice. The board shall approve an examination for oc-4 cupational therapists and an examination for occupa-5 tional therapy assistants and establish standards for 6 an acceptable performance.

7 <u>3. Time and place. Applicants for licensure</u> 8 <u>shall be examined at a time and place and under such</u> 9 <u>supervision as the board may require.</u> Examinations 10 <u>shall be given at least twice each year at such</u> 11 <u>places as the board may determine.</u> The board shall 12 <u>give reasonable public notice of these examinations</u> 13 <u>in accordance with its rules.</u>

14 4. Scores; review. Applicants may obtain their
 15 examination scores and may review their papers in ac 16 cordance with rules as the board may establish.

17 §2281. Waiver of requirements for licensure

18 The board shall grant a license to any person 19 who, prior to the effective date of this chapter, has 20 successfully completed an examination administered by 21 the Psychological Corporation under contract with the 22 American Occupational Therapy Association if he meets 23 the requirements of section 2279, subsections 1, 2, 3 24 and 4.

25 §2282. Issuance of license

26The board shall issue a license to any person who27meets the requirements of this chapter upon payment28of the prescribed license fee.

29 §2283. Renewal of license

30 1. Biennial renewal. Any license issued under 31 this chapter shall be subject to biennial renewal and shall expire, unless renewed in the manner prescribed 32 by the rules of the board, upon the payment of a re-33 34 newal fee. Licenses may be renewed up to 90 days after the date of expiration upon payment of a late fee 35 36 of \$10 in addition to the renewal fee. Any person 37 who submits an application for renewal more than 90 38 days after the license renewal date shall be subject 39 to all requirements governing new applicants under

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this chapter, except that the board may in its discretion, giving due consideration to the protection of the public, waive examination if that renewal application is made within 2 years from the date of that expiration.

6 2. Inactive status. Upon request, the board 7 shall grant inactive status to a licensee who does 8 not practice as an occupational therapist or an occu-9 pational therapy assistant, does not present himself 10 as an occupational therapist or an occupational 11 therapy assistant and maintains any continuing compe-12 tency requirements established by the board.

13 <u>3. Continue competency. Each license renewal</u> 14 <u>shall be accompanied with evidence of continuing</u> 15 competencies.

16 §2284. Foreign trained applicants

17 Foreign trained occupational therapists and occu-18 pational therapy assistants shall satisfy the examination requirements of section 2279. The board shall 19 20 require foreign trained applicants to furnish proof of demonstrated ethical practice and completion of 21 educational and supervised fieldwork requirements 22 equivalent to those contained in section 2279 before 23 24 taking the examination.

25 §2285. Fees

Amount. Fees may be established by the board
 in amounts which are reasonable and necessary for
 their respective purposes. The fees may not exceed
 the following amounts:

- 30 A. For an initial application, \$80;
- 31 B. For biennial renewal of a license, \$80; and
- 32 C. For a temporary license, \$25.

2. Disposal of fees. All fees received by the
board shall be paid to the Treasurer of State to be
used for carrying out this chapter. Any balance of
fees shall not lapse but shall be carried forward as
a continuing account to be expended for the same purposes in the following fiscal years.

1 §2286. Suspension and revocation of license; refusal 2 to renew

3 1. Suspension; revocation; denial; nonrenew-4 al. The board may deny a license or refuse to renew a license, may suspend or revoke a license or may im-5 pose probationary conditions if the licensee or ap-6 7 plicant for license has been found guilty of unpro-8 fessional conduct which has endangered or is likely 9 to endanger the health, welfare or safety of the public. Unprofessional conduct includes, but 10 is not limited to, the following: 11

12 A. Obtaining a license by means of fraud, mis-13 representation or concealment of material facts;

- 14B. Being guilty of unprofessional conduct, as15defined by the rules established by the board, or16violating the code of ethics adopted and pub-17lished by the board;
- 18 C. Subject to the limitations of Title 5, chap-19 ter 341, being convicted of a Class A, B or C 20 crime or of a crime which, if committed in this 21 State, would be punishable by one year or more of 22 imprisonment;
- 23D. Violating any lawful order or rule rendered24or adopted by the board; or
- 25 E. Violating any provision of this chapter.

26 2. Hearing; reinstatement. A denial, refusal to 27 renew, suspension, revocation or imposition of proba-28 tionary conditions upon a license may be ordered by the board after a hearing in the manner provided by 29 30 the rules adopted by the board. An application for 31 reinstatement may be made to the board one year from the date of revocation of a license. The board may 32 33 accept or reject an application for reinstatement and 34 hold a hearing to consider the reinstatement.

35 STATEMENT OF FACT

36 This new draft assures conformity by the Board of 37 Occupational Therapy Practice to the uniform administrative procedures being established by the Department of Business, Occupational and Professional Regulation. All the provisions of this new draft will then be the same as for all other boards within the department.

6 This new draft reflects suggestions by the de-7 partment that came after the bill was printed.

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
