4 PART G

 Capital Expenditures. Capital Expenditures in fiscal year 1985 shall be made, provided that funds are available. If it is necessary to make any reductions in the budget, those reductions shall be made first in the Capital Expenditures line-item.

The department shall not expend funds for Capital Expenditures in fiscal year 1984, other than those included in the revised work program for account number 4550.1 which totals approximately \$85,000.

14 PART H

Borrowing from the General Fund. To solve the cash-flow problem of the Fisheries and Wildlife Fund, subject to the approval of the Governor, the department may borrow up to \$1,000,000 from the General Fund during fiscal year 1984-85. Any moneys borrowed shall be repaid to the General Fund before June 30, 1985, with interest. The rate of interest shall be determined by the Treasurer of State, based on the average rate of interest earned on funds invested during the period of the loan.

The legal voters of each city, town and plantation shall vote by ballot on this question and shall designate their choice by a cross or check mark placed within a corresponding square below the word "Yes" or "No." The ballots shall be received, sorted, counted and declared in open ward, town and plantation meetings and returns made to the Secretary of State in the same manner as votes for members of the Legislature. The Governor shall review the returns and shall proclaim, without delay, the total number of ballots in favor of and opposed to the dedication of a percentage of the sales and use tax to the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife.

The Secretary of State shall prepare and furnish to each city, town and plantation all ballots, returns and copies of this Act necessary to carry out the purposes of this advisory referendum.

24 FISCAL NOTE

25 This bill makes changes concerning the allocation 26 of funds for the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife as follows: Part A has a net deallocation of 27 \$339,935 in fiscal year 1985, Part B has a net 28 29 cation of \$1,964,903 for fiscal year 1985, Part C has net allocation for fiscal year 1985 of \$150,000, 30 and Part D has a net allocation of \$170,500 for fis-31 32 year 1985. Part H will result in a cost to the department of interest accrued on funds borrowed from 33 the General Fund of an amount to be determined. Part 34 35 L will increase department revenues by approximately \$319,000 in fiscal year 1985. These revenues are ex-36 37 pected to decrease by 50%-60% after the first year of

issuance. Part P will result in a cost to the Gener-1 2 Fund of the amount of the cost of referendum. 3 addition, 6/10 of 1% of total annual sales and use 4 tax collections amounts to approximately \$2,000,000 5 based on the sales and use tax estimated revenues for 6 fiscal year 1985. If this Part results in future en-7 actment of such legislation, there will be an 8 loss of revenue to the General Fund of an estimated 9 \$2,000,000. Part Q will result in an increase in de-10 partment revenues due to the sale of licenses by estimated \$332,000 in fiscal year 1985, an estimated 11 12 \$1,494,000 in fiscal year 1986 and an estimated \$1,992,000 in fiscal year 1987. These revenue fig-13 14 ures do not make any provision for sales resistance.

STATEMENT OF FACT

Part A allocates funds in line-item form for fiscal year 1984-85 to the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife and establishes a position count.

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Part B allocates federal funds for the operation of the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife for fiscal year 1984-85

Part C allocates funds from the Maine Endangered and Nongame Wildlife Fund for fiscal year 1984-85 to the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife.

Part D allocates federal funds received from the Recreational Boating Safety Financial Assistance Program for fiscal year 1984-85 to the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife.

Part E ensures the elimination of the position of Staff Attorney and Assistant to the Commissioner.

Part F contains provisions governing the expenditure of funds for the Division of Fisheries and Hatcheries and provides that personnel shall not be reassigned to other positions within the division.

Part G provides that Capital Expenditures in fiscal year 1985 will be the first line-item category to be reduced if the department needs to bring expenditures into line with revenues. This Part also

freezes the level of expenditures in fiscal year 1983-84 on Capital Expenditures.

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Part H provides for the borrowing of up to \$1,000,000 from the General Fund to be paid back with interest by June 30, 1985.

Part I requires the department to keep a flight plan and journal system and provide a summary to the joint standing committee of the Legislature have jurisdiction over inland fisheries and wildlife.

Part J provides for a report on the Nongame Wildlife Program and ensures that all funds expended are allocated by the Legislature.

Part K adjusts the statutes to comply with Part E.

Part L requires the purchase of a migratory waterfowl permit in the form of a stamp to hunt migratory waterfowl. This stamp is in addition to a federal stamp which is currently required. It authorizes the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife to conduct an art contest to select the design of the stamp and any related art work, such as prints. Sale of the stamps and prints should provide additional operating revenues to the department.

In order to expedite the design and reproduction of stamps and their art work for the 1984 fall season, it is necessary to give the commissioner authority, for the 1984 season, to contract directly with marketing representatives prior to the promulgation of any rules to cary out the Migratory Waterfowl Stamp Program.

Administrative costs of the program are assumed by the marketing representative and no department funds will be required to administer this program.

Part M ensures that an evaluation report on activities carried out by the Division of Fisheries and Hatcheries and the Division of Wildlife Management and Visitors Center be provided to the joint standing committee of the Legislature have jurisdiction over inland fisheries and wildlife.

Part N reinstates the majority of positions that have been eliminated due to the staff layoffs by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife.

 Part O provides that the allocation of funds in Part A will be decreased automatically by any appropriation from the General Fund.

Part P provides a referendum to determine the sentiment of the people as to whether or not 6/10 of 1% of the total annual sales and use tax collections should be dedicated to the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife.

Part Q provides for across-the-board increases in the license fees of \$2 in fiscal year 1984-85, plus an additional \$1 in fiscal year 1986, and an additional \$1 in fiscal year 1987, except for combination licenses which will increase by \$4 in fiscal year 1985, \$2 in fiscal year 1986 and \$2 in fiscal year 1987. There is no increase in the junior licenses.

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
