26 27 28	§7910. Assessment of and care planning for adult boarding home and foster home residents who receive state assistance; rules			
29 30 31 32 33	Every individual who is eligible to receive state assistance for a portion of the costs of adult boarding home or foster care and who is referred to or otherwise seeks admission to a boarding or foster care home shall have an assessment performed prior to

The agency of State Government or its agent performing the assessment shall, using a form approved by the department, indicate the need for boarding or foster home placement, develop a plan of care which meets the requirements of the department when placement is sought in a boarding or foster home, and provide periodic follow-up as necessary.			
8 9 10 11	The department shall develop an intake and referral system to assist persons who seek admission by referring them to the appropriate agency for assessment and development of a plan of care.			
12 13 14 15 16 17 18	The Department of Human Services and the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation shall report biennially to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and institutional services, commencing in January 1986, on the intake and referral system, the appropriateness of placements and the service needs which have been identified.

33 34 35	The 110th Legislature established a Study Committee to review the boarding and to make recommendations to the Legislature	home program

improvements. The legislation proposed was unable to be considered during the session.

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Since then, numerous advances have been made improve the administration of the boarding home program. A major recommendation relating to residents, which has been addressed through 2 demonstration pilot projects, is that there be a standardized assessment of residents' abilities, needs and independent living skills in order to determine care and services needed on an individual and population basis. Assessments provide the basis for assuring appropriate placement and service provision. Such systems are now provided to the mentally retarded and adult protective services population residing in boarding homes and adult foster homes. This new draft expands system, through community agencies, state-assisted mentally ill, elderly and other individuals; it ensures that each resident both receives services which maximize the ability to live independently and is appropriately placed.

This new draft will meet the needs of new residents entering a boarding home or adult foster home and sets the system in place for the Department of Human Services' implementation of new boarding home regulations which require provision of services based on assessments and individual plans of care.

This initiative is a result of a 1983 Blaine House Conference on Aging resolution.

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
