19 20 21	AN ACT to Establish a Commission to Assess the Loss of Farmland in Maine.
22 23	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
24 25 26 27 28 29 30 31 32 33 34 35	Sec. 1. Commission on farmland loss. It is the policy of the State to ensure an adequate and affordable supply of productive agricultural land to meet the needs of existing and future agricultural operations, to protect viable agricultural lands from conversion to development, to protect agricultural operations from constraints on necessary agricultural practices due to encroachment of incompatible land uses into farming areas, to enhance the economic viability of agricultural operations and to support the supply and market structures needed for a viable agricultural economy in order to arrest the abandon-

ment of productive agricultural land and its subsequent reversion to forested land and conversion to development.

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- 1. Commission established. A Commission on Farmland Loss is established to assess the problem of farmland loss in Maine and to report its findings and recommendations for legislative action to the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture during the 112th Legislature. This report shall be made no later than January 15, 1985.
 - The Commission on Farmland Loss shall have 15 members, including 2 members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, both of whom shall be chosen from the membership of the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture and one of whom shall represent each political party; 2 members of the Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate, both of whom shall be chosen from the membership of the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture and one of whom shall be chosen to represent each political party; one representative each selected the Maine Farm Bureau, the Maine Association of Conservation Districts, the Maine the Maine Organic Farmers and Gardeners Grange, Association, the Maine Municipal Association and the Maine Homebuilders Association; the chairman of the State Soil and Water Conservation Commission; 3 members representing the public at large, who shall not be elected officials currently holding office and who shall not be directly associated with either agricultural enterprises or organizations. The public members shall be appointed by the Governor, and the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources, who shall serve as a nonvoting chairman of the commission.

B. The commission shall:

(1) Further define the nature of the problem. The commission shall examine current information about the nature of farmland loss in Maine, shall support additional studies as necessary to develop a common understanding of the causes and extent of farmland loss throughout Maine, and shall, in its final report, describe the nature of farmland loss in Maine;

- (2) Describe Maine's important agricultural land. The commission shall consider the characteristics of agricultural land which the State in its policy and programs is seeking to protect. The commission shall make recommendations as to how the land should be identified;
- (3) Review programs in other states for the protection of agricultural land. The commission shall review agricultural land protection programs in other states and shall consider which of those programs are most appropriate to Maine in light of the nature of Maine's farmland loss in various parts of the State, their effectiveness in preventing future farmland loss, their impact on farmers, other landowners and taxpayers and the financial resources available to deal with the problem of farmland loss;
- (4) Hold public hearings. The commission shall hold at least 5 public hearings throughout the State to report on its assessment of the nature of farmland loss in Maine, the characteristics of land to be protected and farmland protection programs in other states. At these hearings, the commission shall solicit public input on the kind of programs which would be most appropriate for Maine; and
- (5) Recommend a farmland protection program. The commission shall, in its final report, make recommendations to the 112th Legislature for legislation to reduce farmland loss. These recommendations shall reflect the findings of the commission with respect to commission activities under paragraphs A to C.
- C. The commission shall be provided staff support by the Department of Agriculture, Food and

21	STATEMENT OF FACT
22 23 24 25 26	This new draft establishes a state policy which recognizes the importance of agriculture to the state's economy and the need to ensure an adequate and affordable supply of productive agricultural land as the basis for that activity.

The new draft also creates a 15-member Commission on Farmland Loss to further define the nature of farmland loss in Maine; to define those agricultural lands which are important to protect; to review programs in other states to protect agricultural land and to identify those applicable to Maine; to hold public hearings throughout the State to report its findings and solicit public input on appropriate actions to protect Maine's important agricultural lands; and to recommend a farmland protection program to the 112th Legislature.

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
