	AN ACT to Designate "Pertica quadrifaria" the Official Fossil of the State of Maine.
	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
	1 MRSA §216 is enacted to read:
	§216. State fossil
	"Pertica quadrifaria" shall be designated as the official fossil of the State of Maine.
	STATEMENT OF FACT
	Maine currently has an official state tree, animal, bird, flower, insect, fish and mineral, but not an official state fossil. A growing number of states are naming official fossils to increase awareness of their state's natural history. "Pertica quadrifaria,"

one of the earliest land plants known would be an ideal official fossil for Maine. Remains of this internationally significant 400 million year old plant are found at only 3 places in the world other than Maine.

Designation of "Pertica quadrifaria" as the state fossil would substantially raise public awareness of the age and significance of Maine's geologic setting.
