shall have brakes adjusted so as to stop such vehicles within a distance of 30 feet from a speed of miles per hours. Every such vehicle and combination of vehicles, except motorcycles and motor driven cyshall be equipped with parking brakes adequate to hold the vehicle on any grade on which it is operated, under all conditions of loading, on a from snow, ice or loose material. The parking brakes shall be capable of being applied in conformwith the foregoing requirements by the driver's muscular effort or by spring action or by equivalent means. Their operation may be assisted by the service brakes or other source of power, provided that failure of the service brake actuation system or other power assisting mechanism will not prevent the parking brakes from being applied in conformance with the foregoing requirements. The parking brakes shall so designed that when once applied they shall remain applied with the required effectiveness despite exany source of energy or leakage of any haustion of kind. The same brake drums, brake shoes and lining assemblies, brake shoe anchors and mechanical brake shoe actuation mechanism normally associated with the wheel brake assemblies may be used for both the service brakes and the parking brakes. If the means of applying the parking brakes and the service brakes are connected in any way, they shall be so constructed that failure of any one part shall not leave the vehicle without operative brakes. No signaling device shall be unnecessarily sounded nor any braking acceleration unnecessarily made so as to cause a harsh, objectionable or unreasonable noise, bell or siren shall be installed or used on any motor vehicle except that fire and police department vehicles and ambulances, and vehicles operated by state, fire inspectors, city and town fire and town chiefs, assistant fire chiefs, police chiefs and assistant police chiefs may be so equipped for use only when responding to emergency calls, and such motor vehicles used by sheriffs and deputy sheriffs, liquor inspectors, and such motor vehicles used by inland fisheries and game wardens as may be nated by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife and such motor vehicles used by coastal wardens as may be designated by the Department of Marine and such motor vehicles used by United sources, States Government law enforcement officials, and such

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1 motor vehicles used by a state or municipal depart-2 ment which controls or supervises electrical alarm 3 and communication systems.

- 2. Police department vehicles. Lights used on police department vehicles and on motor vehicles operated by chiefs of police, state fire inspectors, state liquor inspectors, inland fisheries and game wardens, sea and shore fisheries wardens, Baxter State Park rangers, sheriffs and deputy sheriffs shall emit a blue beam of light.

## 13 STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to provide state liquor enforcement officers with the same safety equipment, that being a flashing blue light and siren used by all other state law enforcement officers.

The current law provides that the liquor enforcement officers have the responsibility to enforce Maine laws to control liquor and dangerous drugs and all other powers to arrest any person committing a crime in an officers presence. The law now provides that for these purposes liquor enforcement officers have the same powers as sheriffs in their respective counties and these powers can only be exercised by officers who have completed training at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy.

Successful completion of this mission and the ability to arrest drivers operating motor vehicles while under the influence of alcohol and drugs requires the same use of flashing lights and sirens as those granted other state law enforcement personnel.

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
