or experience to perform the duties required in subsection 2. At least one of the liaisons shall be the parent of a hearing impaired child.

2. Duties. The family liaison shall:

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- A. Be available to meet or talk with the parents of an exceptional child concerning the needs of the child and of the family, the appropriate federal laws and state laws and regulations and the services available to the child and the family; and
- B. At the request of the parents, attend and participate in the team meetings regarding the child's educational program.
- The family liaison who is the parent of a hearing impaired child shall also assist the commissioner in the establishment and implementation of the support programs established in section 7503, subsection 9.
- 9. Support programs. The commissioner shall establish support programs within the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf to provide services to the deaf community anywhere within the State and to their families. The support programs shall include such services as:
- A. Offering parent workshops, both at the school and outside the school, covering such topics as deaf culture, sex education, deaf adolescence and coping strategies for parents and siblings;
- B. Developing a lending library on deafness to be housed at the Maine State Library;
- 32 C. Publishing a course catalog for the school;
- 33 D. Distributing a monthly news letter to parents of children attending the school;
- E. Setting up programs which allow students to experience independent living conditions, learn

- the responsibilities and benefits of operating commercial business activities, purchase personal items at the school and interact in informal social settings;
- F. Establishing a method for assisting parents
 to purchase specialized devices for the deaf; and
 - G. Arranging for banking services for students boarding at the school.
 - Sec. 3. Implementation, pilot project, report of the commissioner. The provisions of this Act shall be implemented as a pilot project and shall terminate on June 30, 1987, unless continued by Act of the Legislature. The Commissioner of Educational and Cultural Services shall begin implementation of this Act, including hiring at least one family liaison, by January 1, 1986, and shall report his experiences, findings and recommendations to the First Regular Session of the 113th Legislature.

19 STATEMENT OF FACT

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The purpose of this bill is to establish a pilot project providing the position of family liaison within the Department of Educational and Cultural Services and to provide a series of support programs at the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf. Currently, when parents of exceptional children participate in the Individual Educational Plans and Pupil Evaluation Team process they must deal in an unfamiliar setting with an array of professionals who sometimes present things in technical language. In those circumstances, the parents, who are the ones most familiar with the educational needs of their child, are often intimidated and are unable to participate in the process in an appropriate way. The result may be the development of an educational plan that is inappropriate for the child, which frustrates the child and parents and subverts the purpose of the process.

This bill provides for up to 3 liaison positions within the Department of Educational and Cultural Services to be staffed by appropriately trained or

experienced parents of exceptional children. The liaisons would act as a link between the professional administrators, teachers and advocates and the parents. They would be responsible for working with parents to help them understand their rights, the various laws and regulations affecting them and the network of services available to their child. At least one of the 3 liaisons would be the parent of a hearing impaired child.

 The bill also requires the Commissioner of Educational and Cultural Services to set up a series of support programs at the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf to provide services to students at the school and to the deaf community and their families throughout the State. The family liaison who is the parent of a hearing impaired child advises the commissioner in implementing the support programs.

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
