Whereas, this volume determined pricing schedule is bound to cause economic difficulties for small stores to maintain their clientele and serve their communities; and

5 Whereas, the Maine Milk Commission formulated the 6 pricing structure for its order 85-2 with the assump-7 tion that volume discounting would be in effect; and

8 Whereas, the Legislature, as a matter of policy, 9 has decided that the Maine Milk Commission minimum 10 prices should be reflective of a single minimum price 11 per unit; and

12 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, 13 these facts create an emergency within the meaning of 14 the Constitution of Maine and require the following 15 legislation as immediately necessary for the preser-16 vation of the public peace, health and safety; now, 17 therefore,

18 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as 19 follows:

20 Sec. 1. 7 MRSA §2954, sub-§2, as repealed and 21 replaced by PL 1975, c. 517, §3, is repealed and the 22 following enacted in its place:

23 Considerations in establishing prices. In 24 establishing and changing minimum wholesale and re-25 tail prices, the commission shall also consider the 26 importance of maintaining a strong and viable dairy 27 industry in Maine, taking into account the relative 28 economic benefits dairy farming bestows on various 29 sections of the State. The commission shall, whenev-er practical, and in accordance with the Constitution 30 31 of Maine and the United States Constitution, through 32 its pricing authority encourage the consumption of 33 milk that is produced and processed in the State.

The commission shall consider in its deliberations the extent of any economic and social benefits of maintaining dairy processing plants in the different geographic regions or the natural marketing areas within the State. In establishing and changing minimum wholesale and retail prices, the prices so es-

1 tablished shall be just and reasonable, taking into 2 due consideration the public health and welfare and 3 the insuring of an adequate supply of pure and whole-4 some milk to the inhabitants of this State under varying conditions in varying marketing areas; pre-5 6 vailing costs in neighboring states; seasonal produc-7 tion and other conditions affecting the costs of production, transportation and marketing in the milk in-8 9 dustry, including a reasonable return to producer, dealer and store; and taking into consideration the 10 public need for the establishment of retail milk 11 12 prices at the lowest practical levels.

13 Sec. 2. 7 MRSA §2954, sub-§4, as repealed and 14 replaced by PL 1975, c. 517, §3, is repealed and the 15 following enacted in its place:

16 4. Commission empowered to establish classifica17 tions of milk. The commission, after investigation
18 and hearing, shall establish a minimum wholesale
19 price per unit of milk without regard to the volume
20 of milk delivered to any retail outlet or classifica21 tion of retail outlets.

22 Sec. 3. 7 MRSA §2954, sub-§10 is enacted to 23 read:

24 10. Temporary pricing guidelines. it is established that until June 1, 1985, or as soon thereafter 25 as the commission can establish a pricing order pur-26 suant to the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, Ti-27 tle 5, chapter 375, drop shipment minimum wholesale 28 29 prices to dealers for whole milk, lowfat milk and 30 skim milk sold in various size containers, regardless of the volume delivered, shall be the prices for those containers in delivery lots of 11 to 20 cases 31 32 33 as they would have been established under order 85-2 for the phase-in period. The prices established 34 35 shall remain effective until the commission's revised pricing order is formulated and established. 36

37	For full service deliveries, these prices shall be
38	increased by the following amounts: Six cents per
39	gallon; 4¢ per 3-quart container; 3¢ per 1/2 gallon;
40	1¢ per quart; and 30¢ per bulk 20-quart container.

1 Prior to June 1, 1985, the commission shall 2 reevaluate its data, hold hearings and formulate a 3 milk pricing order to be effective June 1, 1985, or 4 as soon thereafter as the commission can establish a 5 pricing order pursuant to the Maine Administrative 6 Procedure Act, Title 5, chapter 375.

7 Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited 8 in the preamble, this Act shall take effect when ap-9 proved.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

This new draft eliminates the volume determined 11 pricing system promulgated by the Maine Milk Commis-12 13 sion in its most recent pricing order, 85-2, which would have required higher minimum wholesale prices 14 15 for smaller shipments to retail stores and lower prices for larger deliveries. 16 This new draft also 17 introduces other considerations the Maine Milk Commission must take into account in determining prices, 18 19 and it directs the Maine Milk Commission to formulate a revised pricing order to be effective June 1, 1985. 20

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
