19 20	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

24	§8001. Department; agencies within department
25 26 27 28 29 30 31 32	There is created and established the Department of Business, Occupational and Professional Regula- tion, in this chapter referred to as the "depart- ment," to regulate financial institutions, insurance companies, commercial sports, grantors of consumer credit and to license and regulate professions and occupations. The department shall be composed of the following bureaus, boards and commissions:

4	CHAPTER 105
5	DIETITIANS AND NUTRITIONISTS
6	§9901. Declaration of purpose
7	In order to safeguard public health, safety and
8	welfare, to protect the public from incompetent and
9	unauthorized persons, to assure the highest degree of
10	professional conduct on the part of dietitians,
11	nutritionists and dietetic technicians and to assure
12	the availability of dietetic services of high quality
13	to persons in need of those services, it is the pur-
14	pose of this chapter to provide for the regulation of
15	persons offering dietetic services.
16	§9902. Definitions
17	As used in this chapter, unless the context oth-
18	erwise indicates, the following terms have the fol-
19	lowing meanings.
20	1. Board. "Board" means the Board of Dietetic
21	Practice established under this chapter.
22	2. Commissioner. "Commissioner" means the Com-
23	missioner of Business, Occupational and Professional
24	Regulation.
25	3. Department. "Department" means the Depart-
26	ment of Business, Occupational and Professional Regu-
27	lation.
28	4. Dietetics. "Dietetics" means the profession-
29	al discipline of applying and integrating scientific
30	principles of nutrition pursuant to different health,
31	social, cultural, physical, psychological and econom-
32	ic conditions to the proper nourishment, care and ed-
33	ucation of individuals or groups throughout the life
34	cycle. Dietitics includes the application and inte-
35	gration of these principles to:

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1	A. Assess the nutritional needs of individuals
2	and groups and determine the source of con-
3	straints in the various practice settings;
4	B. Establish priorities, goals and objectives
5	that meet nutritional needs and are consistent
6	with available resources and constraints;
7 8	C. Provide nutrition counseling in both health and disease; and
9 10	D. Develop, implement and manage systems in clinical nutrition care.
11	5. Dietetic technician. "Dietetic technician"
12	means a person who assists in the practice of
13	dietetics under the supervision of a dietitian and
14	nutritionist of no less than 8 hours a month and who
15	is licensed in accordance with this chapter.
16	6. Dietitian and nutritionist. "Dietitian and
17	Nutritionist" means a person licensed to practice
18	dietetics under this chapter.
19	7. Nutrition aide. "Nutrition aide" means a
20	person who assists in the provision of dietetic and
21	nutritional information in university extension pro-
22	grams.
23	§9903. Board of Dietetic Practice; establishment;
24	compensation
25	1. Establishment and membership. There is es-
26	tablished within the Department of Business, Occupa-
27	tional and Professional Regulation, a Board of
28	Dietetic Practice. The board shall consist of 5 mem-
29	bers appointed by the Governor. The persons ap-
30	pointed to the board other than the public member,
31	must have been engaged in rendering dietetic and nu-
32	tritional services to the public, teaching or re-
33	search in dietetics for at least 2 years immediately
34	preceding their appointments. At least 3 board mem-
35	bers shall be dietitians and nutritionists. The 4th
36	member shall be either a dietitian or a dietetic
37	technician. These members shall at all times be
38	holders of valid licenses for the practice of
39	dietetics in the State, except for the members of the

1 first board, all of whom shall fulfill the require-2 ments for licensure of this chapter. The remaining 3 member shall be a representative of the public.

4 2. Terms of appointment. The Governor, within 5 60 days following the effective date of this chapter, 6 shall appoint 2 board members for a term of one year, 2 for a term of 2 years and one for a term of 3 7 years. Appointments made thereafter shall be for 8 9 3-year terms, but no person may be appointed to serve 10 more than 2 consecutive terms. Terms shall begin on the first day of the calendar year and end on the 11 12 last day of the calendar year or until successors are appointed, except for the first appointed members who 13 shall serve through the last calendar day of the year 14 15 in which they are appointed, before commencing the terms prescribed by this section. 16

17 Any member of the board may be removed from of-18 fice for cause by the Governor. A member may not 19 serve more than 2 full successive terms, provided 20 that, for this purpose only, a period actually served 21 which exceeds 1/2 of the 3-year term shall be deemed 22 a full term.

23 3. Meetings. The board shall meet during the 24 first month of each calendar year to select a chairman and for other purposes. At least one additional 25 26 meeting shall be held before the end of each calendar year. Other meetings may be convened at the call of 27 the chairman or the written request of any 2 board 28 29 members. A majority of the members of the board 30 shall constitute a quorum for all purposes.

31 4. Compensation. Members of the board shall re 32 ceive no compensation for their services, but shall
 33 be entitled to expenses on the same basis as provided
 34 for state employees.

35 §9904. Board of Dietetics Practice; powers and du-36 ties

37 1. Powers. The board shall administer and en-38 force this chapter and evaluate the qualifications of 39 applicants for licensure. The board may issue sub-40 poenas, examine witnesses, administer oaths and may 41 investigate or cause to be investigated any com1 plaints made to it or any cases of noncompliance with 2 or violation of this chapter.

3 2. Rules. The board may adopt, in accordance with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, Title 5, 4 5 chapter 375, rules relating to professional conduct 6 to carry out the policy of this chapter, including, 7 but not limited to, rules relating to professional 8 licensure and to the establishment of ethical stan-9 dards of practice for persons holding a license to 10 practice dietetics in this State.

11 3. Hearings. Hearings may be conducted by the 12 board to assist with investigations, to determine 13 whether grounds exist for suspension, revocation or 14 denial of a license, or as otherwise deemed necessary 15 to the fulfillment of its responsibilities under this 16 chapter.

17 4. Records. The board shall keep such records
 18 and minutes as are necessary to the ordinary dispatch
 19 of its functions.

20 <u>5. Contracts. The board may enter into con-</u> 21 <u>tracts to carry out its responsibilities under this</u> 22 <u>chapter.</u>

6. Reports. No later than August 1st of each
year, the board shall submit to the commissioner, for
the preceding fiscal year ending June 30th, its annual report of its operations and financial position,
together with such comments and recommendations as
the commissioner deems essential.

29 §9905. Board of Dietetic Practice; administrative 30 provisions

31 1. Officers. The board shall appoint a secre 32 tary and may appoint other officers as it deems nec 33 essary.

2. Employees. With the advice of the board, the commissioner may appoint, subject to the Personnel Law, such employees as may be necessary to carry out this chapter. Any person so employed shall be located in the department and under the administrative and supervisory direction of the commissioner.

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3. Budget. The board shall submit to the com-1 missioner its budgetary requirements in the same man-2 ner as is provided in Title 5, section 1665. 3 §9906. Licenses 4 5 1. License required. No person may practice dietetics, or hold himself out to be a dietitian, 6 7 nutritionist, diet technician or use related terms or 8 words, unless he is licensed in accordance with this 9 chapter. 2. Individual license. Only an individual may 10 11 be licensed under this chapter. 3. Penalty; injunction. A person who violates the provisions of this section or any lawful order or 12 13 14 rule of the board is guilty of a Class E crime. 15 The State may bring an action in Superior Court 16 to enjoin any person from violating this chapter, regardless of whether proceedings have been or may be 17 instituted in the Administrative Court or whether 18 19 criminal proceedings have been or may be instituted. 20 §9907. Persons and practices exempt 21 Nothing in this chapter may be construed as pre-2.2 venting or restricting the practice, services or ac-23 tivities of: <u>1. Licensed persons. Any person licensed in this State by any other law from engaging in the pro-</u> 24 25 fession or occupation for which he is licensed; 26 2. Students or trainees. Any person pursuing a supervised course of study leading to a degree in nu-27 28 29 trition or dietetics at an accredited or approved educational program, if the person is designated by a 30 31 title which clearly indicates his status as a student 32 or trainee; 3. Nutrition aides. Nutrition\_aides; 33 34 4. Marketing or distribution of food products 35 including dietary supplements. Individuals or em-36 ployees of programs who do not hold themselves out to

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be dietitians or nutritionists and who market or distribute food products, including dietary supplements as defined by the Food and Drug Administration and who may engage in the explanation to and education of customers regarding the use of those products for nontherapeutic needs; or

5. Persons employed in federally funded programs. Persons employed in federally funded head
start and womens, infants and childrens programs as
of the effective date of this chapter.

11 §9908. Temporary license

12 A temporary license may be granted to a person 13 who has completed the education and experience requirements of this chapter. This permit allows the 14 15 person to practice dietetics in association with and under supervision of a licensed dietitian and 16 nutritionist. This permit is valid until the person 17 18 is issued a license under section 9910 or 9911, or until the results of the national exam taken by the 19 person are available to the board. 20

21 §9909. Requirements for licensure

1. Application; requirement. An applicant applying for a license as a dietitian and nutritionist or dietetic technician shall file a written application provided by the board, showing to the satisfaction of the board that he meets the following requirements:

28	A. An applicant applying for a license as a
29	dietitian and nutritionist shall file a written
30	application on forms provided by the board, show-
31	ing to the satisfaction of the board that he is
32	of good moral character and meets the require-
33	ments of this section;

34	B. An applicant shall present evidence satisfac-
35	tory to the board of having successfully com-
36	pleted the academic requirements established by
37	the American Dietetic Association or its equiva-
38	lent as determined by the board and received a
39	baccalaureate or higher degree from an accredited
40	college or university. Such a program shall in-

- 1 <u>clude courses in organic and inorganic chemistry,</u> 2 <u>human physiology, microbiology, principles of</u> 3 <u>sociology or psychology, basic communication</u> 4 <u>skills, economics, food composition, nutrition</u> 5 <u>and management theory;</u>
- 6 C. An applicant shall submit to the board evi-7 dence of having successfully completed the experience requirements approved by the American 8 Dietetic Association or equivalent experience approved by the board. That experience shall in-9 10 11 clude at least 6 months full-time clinical experience in the field of nutrition and dietetics, 12 its part-time equivalent. The experience 13 or 14 shall be acquired during or within 5 years of 15 completion of the academic requirements in paragraph B, and not more than 5 years before the 16 17 date of license application; and
- 18 D. Successful completion of an examination given
   19 by the American Dietetic Association or its
   20 equivalent as determined and administered by the
   21 board.
- 22 <u>2. For a dietetic technician:</u>
- 23A. An applicant applying for a license as a24dietetic technician shall file a written applica-25tion on forms provided by the board, showing to26the satisfaction of the board that he is of good27moral character and meets the requirements of28this section; and
- B. Graduation from a dietetic technician program
  approved by the Commission on Accreditation of
  the American Dietetic Association or its equivalent, as determined by the board, or graduation
  with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Food and Nutrition from an approved 4-year program.
- 35 §9910. Waiver of requirements for licensure

36	The board shall grant a license to any person	
37	who, prior to the effective date of this chapter, has	
38	met the requirements for dietetic registration of the	
39	American Dietetic Association or who has met the re-	
40	quirements for dietetic technicians as set forth in	

1 section 9909 or who has practiced in Maine as a 2 dietetic technician and is deemed by the board to 3 have met the equivalent requirements to function as a 4 dietetic technician.

5 §9911. Issuance of license

6 The board shall issue a license to any person who 7 meets the requirements of this chapter upon payment 8 of the prescribed license fee.

9 §9912. Renewal of license

1. Biennial renewal. Any license issued under 10 11 this chapter shall be subject to biennial renewal and shall expire, unless renewed in the manner prescribed 12 13 by the rules of the board, upon the payment of a re-14 newal fee. Licenses may be renewed up to 90 days af-15 ter the date of expiration upon payment of a late fee 16 of \$10 in addition to the renewal fee. Any person who submits an application for renewal more than 90 17 18 days after the license renewal date shall be subject 19 to all requirements governing new applicants under 20 this chapter, except that the board may in its dis-21 cretion, giving due consideration to the protection of the public, waive examination if that renewal ap-22 23 plication is made within 2 years from the date of 24 that expiration.

25 <u>2. Inactive status. Upon request, the board</u>
 26 shall grant inactive status to a licensee who does
 27 not practice but maintains any continuing competency
 28 requirements established by the board.

29 <u>3. Continued competency. Each license renewal</u> 30 <u>shall be accompanied with evidence of continuing</u> 31 <u>competencies and education as determined by the</u> 32 board.

33 §9913. Disciplinary actions

1. Complaints. The board may order an investigation of a complaint on its own motion or on written complaint filed with the board regarding noncompliance with or violation of any section of this chapter or of any rules adopted by the board.

1	2. Disciplinary actions; grounds. The board may
2	suspend or revoke a license pursuant to Title 5, sec-
3	tion 10004. The board may refuse to renew or the Ad-
4	ministrative Court may revoke, suspend or refuse to
5	renew any license issued under this chapter or any
6	rule or order of the board. The following shall be
7	grounds for an action to refuse to issue, modify,
8	suspend, revoke or refuse to renew the license of a
9	person under this chapter:
10	A. The practice of fraud or deceit in obtaining
11	a license under this chapter or in connection
12	with service rendered within the scope of the li-
13	cense issued;
14	B. Unprofessional conduct. A licensee shall be
15	deemed to have engaged in unprofessional conduct
16	if he violates any standard of professional be-
17	havior which has been established in the practice
18	for which the licensee is licensed;
19	C. Subject to the limitations of Title 5, chap-
20	ter 341, conviction of a crime which involves
21	dishonesty or false statement or which relates
22	directly to the practice for which the licensee
23	is licensed or conviction of any crime for which
24	imprisonment for one year or more may be imposed;
25	or
26 27	D. Any violation of this chapter or rules adopted by the board .
28	3. Reinstatement. An application for reinstate-
29	ment may be made to the board one year from the date
30	of revocation of a license. The board may accept or
31	reject an application for reinstatement and hold a
32	hearing to consider the reinstatement.
33	§9914. Fees
34	1. Amount. Fees may be established by the board
35	in amounts which are reasonable and necessary for
36	their respective purposes. The fees may not exceed
37	the following amounts:
38 39	A. For an initial application for a dietitian and nutritionist license, \$80;

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- 1B. For an initial application for a dietetic2technician license, \$60; or
- 3 C. For a temporary license, \$25.
- 4 <u>Biennial renewal of licenses shall be for the same</u> 5 amount as initial licenses.

6 2. Disposal of fees. All fees received by the 7 board shall be paid to the Treasurer of State to be 8 used for carrying out this chapter. Any balance of 9 fees shall not lapse but shall be carried forward as 10 a continuing account to be expended for the same pur-11 poses in the following fiscal years.

12 §9915. Reciprocity

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13 The board may, in its discretion, grant a license 14 under this chapter to an individual licensed in an-15 other state if it determines that the requirements or 16 standards for licensure in that state are equivalent 17 to, or greater than, this chapter.

STATEMENT OF FACT

Americans today spend billions of dollars on health fraud, unproven cures and unnecessary, and in some cases, dangerous food and vitamin supplements. As Americans interest in nutrition and health continues to grow, more and more individuals are going into the business of providing information, counseling and other related services to citizens.

In order to protect the public, most other health care professionals, and nonhealthcare occupations, are currently licensed by the State. There are no guidelines or standards at the state level for determining qualified professionals in the field of dietetics.

32 Currently in Maine, over 200 trained dietitians 33 and dietetic technicians work in a variety of set-34 tings, including hospitals, nursing homes, facilities 35 for the retarded, the public schools, private prac-36 tice and even in corporations. They have come to be 37 recognized as an increasingly important part of the health care continuum and the overall medical team, providing advice frequently to individuals suffering from diabetes and other acute or chronic illnesses.

4 bill establishes a licensing board and pro-This 5 cess for dietitians and nutritionists in Maine. Tt. 6 this process in the Department of Business, sets up 7 Professional and Occupational Regulation and conforms 8 to all of the standard administrative procedures de-9 veloped for licensing boards adopted by that depart-10 ment in the last several years.

11 This bill delineates specific licensing standards 12 for dietitians and nutritionists and for dietetic 13 technicians. It does not require licensing for 14 weight-control programs such as Weight Watchers or 15 Diet Centers because of the involvement of physi-16 cians, nurses and other already-licensed profession-17 als within those programs.

18 This bill is supported by physicians, hospital 19 administrators, consumers and others who have had ex-20 perience in dealing with dietitians and nutritionists 21 and recognize the value and the timeliness of a li-22 censing mechanism for this profession.

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
