STATEMENT OF FACT

American sign language is recognized as a language and may be taught in public schools in educational programs for both hearing and deaf students. This bill recognizes American sign language as being the equivalent of a foreign language for the purpose of fulfilling a student's graduation requirement. It also states that American sign language may be considered as a 2nd foreign language offering by an administrative unit.
