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K. The disclosure of addresses to the Maine State Retirement System when requested by its board of trustees of persons identified by the Executive Director of the Maine State Retirement System to assist that board in the proper operation of the Maine State Retirement System and the executive director in fulfilling the executive director's administrative responsibility in respect to the Maine State Retirement System.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The Maine State Retirement System has 24,000 inactive accounts in its files. There are 3 types of accounts: Small accounts representing brief periods of employment and upon which the system may be paying no interest; accounts of persons who are vested under the Maine State Retirement System and who are waiting until normal retirement age to apply for benefits; and accounts of persons eligible for retirement, who are unaware that they must apply for retirement. The system has no addresses for the owners of these accounts and proposes to use addresses available through the Bureau of Taxation in order to these persons. The system is seeking to notify owners inactive accounts that they have funds on deposit with the Maine State Retirement System and, in many instances, offering them an opportunity to benefit financially from this knowledge. There are tax benefits to the State in allowing the Maine State Retire-System to contact these account holders. sons withdrawing funds would pay taxes on any accrued interest and retirees would pay state income taxes on retirement allowances.

In cleaning files, the system found the file of Alexander T. Andrews who worked at Pineland from November 1953 until early 1967. If alive, Mr. Andrews is about 66 years old. In 1973, Mr. Andrews contacted the retirement system and inquired as to his benefits. The Maine State Retirement System has never heard from Mr. Andrews since. Today there is \$14,385

in this account. The retirement system cannot find Mr. Andrews. If alive, Mr. Andrews would be receiving a retirement allowance upon which taxes would be paid to the State. Alternatively, he or his beneficiary could take a lump-sum refund and pay taxes to the State on the accrued interest.

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
