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STATEMENT OF FACT

2 A number of school districts have been unable to 3 construct needed school facilities because of the debt service limit of \$30,000,000 which has been 4 in 5 place since 1977. In September, 1984, the Legisla-6 ture increased the debt service limit to \$35,000,000 7 and at the same time specified that priorities should 8 be established for school construction necessitated by the requirements of the Education Reform Act. 9

10 At the present time, there are requests to the 11 State Board of Education for new buildings, additions 12 and renovations totalling an estimated \$85,000,000. 13 In order to meet these school facilities needs in a 14 timely and responsible manner, the State Board of Ed-15 ucation should be provided with some flexibility in 16 terms of the debt service limit.

17 This bill suggests a 10% contingency which would 18 be used only in times of unusually heavy local demand 19 for high priority school construction.

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
