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## §8108 Contracts

- Contracts with children's homes shall be developed in accordance with the following provisions.
- A. Each contract shall state clearly the reasons
  leading to the number of children to be placed
  and for the rates established for payment.
- 7 B. The determination of placements shall be based upon most recent prior usage by the State and overall state policies regarding services to children.
- 11 C. The determination of rates shall be based 12 upon actual allowable historical costs of provid-13 ing services.
- D. Contracts shall be for 2-year periods and be in accordance with biennial appropriations for these services. The commissioner shall identify all available funds for children's home services in their biennial budget requests, including numbers of children to be placed.

## §8109. Advisory group

The commissioner shall establish an advisory group representing all children's homes in the State and shall meet at least annually with this group to review rate and placement policies and procedures.

## STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill is necessary to clarify procedures in contracts developed by the State for placing children at residential treatment facilities. In recent years, the contract procedure has been lagging substantially with the result that: First, contracts have not been signed until well into the contract year and 2nd, the number of "slots" or beds contracted for is well below the number of children previously served. This has occurred regularly for the past 3 to 5 years. When additional children in need of placement are referred to the facility, extreme

delays are incurred. Children and families in need do not receive ready and equal access to the most appropriate treatment setting.

 By setting more specific provisions with respect to what the contract should include and establishing an advisory group from the residential treatment facilities to the State, it is expected that the contract procedure can be streamlined and smoothed. Residential treatment facilities play an important part in the continuance of services available to special needs of children throughout the State and cannot afford to be disrupted by administrative problems created by a very complex state contract system.

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
