Whereas, the Legislature has not established a comprehensive policy framework for the bureau's management decisions; and

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Whereas, the development of such a policy requires substantial public scrutiny and involvement; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Commission established. Resolved: That Adan visory Commission on Public Lands Policy and Management is established to study the current policies and management programs on the public lands in the State. The commission shall consist of the following members: Three members of the House of Representatives, including 2 from the majority political party and one from the minority political party; 3 members of Senate, including 2 members from the majority politiparty and one member from the minority political collectively party: and 5 public members in the fields of conservation, forestknowledgeable ry, recreation, wildlife management and geology. Speaker of the House shall appoint the legislative members from the House and 2 of the public members. The President of the Senate shall appoint the legislative members from the Senate and 2 of the public members. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House shall jointly appoint the 5th public member. The public members shall serve 2-year terms. The commission shall select its own chairman except that the ex officio members shall not serve as the chairman; and be it further

Ex officio members. Resolved: That the Director of the Bureau of Public Lands and the Director of Parks and Recreation shall serve as nonvoting, ex officio members of the commission; and be it further

Study. Resolved: That the commission shall study the current policies and management objectives that guide the use of the state's public lands. The

- tions shall focus on the establishment of a comprehensive and coordinated policy setting and management

Meetings; report. Resolved: That the commission shall hold such hearings and meetings as are necessary to carry out the purposes of this resolve, including at least 4 public hearings to be held throughout the State. The commission shall report its findings together with any necessary legislation for introduction to the First Regular Session of the 113th Legislature; and be it further

Appropriation. Resolved: That there is appropriated from the Public Reserved Lands Management Fund the sum of \$10,000 to carry out the purposes of this resolve. These funds shall be used to pay a per diem to the commission members, including Legislators when the Legislature is not in session, at the same rate as that paid to Legislators; to pay the actual travel, meal and lodging expenses of the commission members; and to pay other actual expenses of the commission. Ex officio members of the commission shall not receive any per diem and their actual expenses shall be borne by their department. The commission may request staff support from the Legislative Council.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve shall take effect when approved.

The State has recovered, in recent years, control and ownership of over 450,000 acres of land, an asset of incalculable value to the people of Maine. In addition, there are a large number of coastal islands, public domain lands and submerged lands also owned by the State. These lands are held in trust for the people and are managed by the Bureau of Public Lands in the Department of Conservation.

The legislative mandate for the management of these lands was written before a complete picture of the state's ownership was available, before the capabilities of the land were fully understood. While the existing mandate is useful, it does not provide sufficient guidance to the Bureau of Public Lands for the management of its large and diverse resource base, nor does it incorporate adequate mechanisms for public review of the bureau's policy and management decisions.

The purpose of this resolve is to establish a commission to investigate the policies and issues involved in the management of the state's public lands. The commission will focus most of its attention on the public reserved lands held and managed by the Bureau of Public Lands, but will examine these in the overall context of all public lands held by the State.

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
