22 23	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

26	§2846. Authorized person
27	For the purposes of this chapter, the "authorized
28	person" responsible for obtaining or filing a permit
29	or certificate shall mean a member of the immediate

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## STATEMENT OF FACT

This new draft makes only one change in the current version of the Revised Statutes, Title 22, 2846. Current law allows a member of the deceased's immediate family to authorize a nonfamily member to obtain death certificates, transportation permits and other permits needed to dispose of a dead human body only if no family member is "physically or mentally capable of the responsibility." This bill removes that ambiguous language and instead allows a family member to authorize a non-family member, if no family member wishes to assume the responsibility. This change allows a family already coping with a personal tragedy to delegate responsibility to someone outside the family without forcing them to publicly declare themselves incapable of performing the In addition, it does not place those asked to assist the family in the difficult position of personally judging the physical and mental state of the family members.

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
