STATEMENT OF FACT

9 This bill provides funds for both a clothing and 10 energy allowance for Aid to Families with Dependent 11 Children families. First, it requires a single, nonlump sum payment in the amount of \$60 per 12 recurring 13 child to be made in September 1985 for the purpose of allowing Aid to Families with Dependent Children fam-14 ilies to purchase school and winter 15 clothing for 16 their children.

17 Secondly, it requires the creation of an energy 18 standard within the standard of need and provides funds for energy assistance payments, calculated on a 19 20 seasonal basis, to all Aid to Families with Dependent 21 Children families which directly or indirectly incur 22 home energy costs. Recent studies have clearly dem-23 onstrated the need for such additional assistance. 24 The present Aid to Families with Dependent Children 25 Standard of Need was developed in 1970 based on the 26 United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor 27 Statistics' family budget for 1969. The delower 28 partment estimates that the standard is presently 29 equivalent to a 1975 level of need. Since the standard was adopted in 1970, the consumer price 30 index for all costs has risen by 108% but has risen by 509% 31 32 for energy related costs. During that same period, 33 the standard of need has risen by only 68%. The Na-34 Consumer Law Center in its publication "Cold tional 35 -- Not by Choice" has determined that Maine's low income families must annually expend \$1,777 for 36 energy 37 costs in a normal year. They determine the average 38 monthly expenditure during the winter to be \$231. The 39 present housing component of the Aid to Families with 40 Dependent Children Standard of Need, which includes 41 rent or mortgage, electricity and energy costs, for a family of 4 is only \$214. 42

1 The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program in 2 1984-1985 provides a maximum benefit of \$400 total or 3 only \$66 per month in the 6-month heating season. 4 The recently submitted federal budget for fiscal year 5 1986 proposes even less revenue to Maine under the 6 Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program, making the 7 energy assistance provided in this bill even more 8 critical.

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
