17 18 19	AN ACT Relating to Service of Process by Sheriffs, Deputies and Constables.
20 21	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
22 23	Sec. 1. 14 MRSA §702 is amended by adding at the end the following:
24 25	A sheriff or his deputy may serve, execute and return civil process outside of his county when:
26 27 28 29	1. Local officers unavailable. Local municipal or county law enforcement officers are unavailable to serve process on a weekend, after business hours or on a holiday;
30 31 32 33	2. Local officers unable to serve. Local munic- ipal or county law enforcement officers are unable to serve civil process due to vacations, illness or at- tention to more pressing law enforcement needs; or

6 7 8	Sec. 2. 14 MRSA §703, as amended by PL 1977, c. 650, §1, is further amended by adding at the end the following:
9 10	A constable may serve, execute and return civil process outside of his municipality when:
11	1. Local officers unavailable. Local municipal
12	or county law enforcement officers are unavailable to
13	serve process on a weekend, after business hours or
14	on a holiday;
15	2. Local officers unable to serve. Local munic-
16	ipal or county law enforcement officers are unable to
17	serve civil process due to vacations, illness or at-
18	tention to more pressing law enforcement needs; or
19	3. Prejudice to parties. The inability or un-
20	availability of local municipal or county law en-
21	forcement personnel may reasonably be expected to
22	prejudice a party to civil litigation related to the
23	process of service.

STATEMENT OF FACT

Under present Maine law, sheriffs, sheriff's dep-2 3 uties and constables are authorized to serve civil 4 process. Sheriffs and their deputies are not allowed 5 to serve process outside their respective counties 6 and constables are restricted to service of process 7 within the municipalities from which they are ap-8 This geographical restriction occasionally pointed. 9 causes hardship to parties who are unable to secure 10 prompt civil process due to the inability or unavail-11 ability of local sheriffs, deputies and constables to 12 respond.

13 The hardship occurs most frequently on weekends 14 and after the close of regular business hours when 15 sheriffs and deputies usually cease serving process. 16 If the local constable is otherwise engaged or ill, 17 process must be delayed until the next business day 18 when a deputy is available. In certain situations, 19 the delay in process can be critical. Emergency in-20 junctions or restraining orders will not become ef-21 fective until served. A deadline for commencing a 22 legal action may expire due to the unavailability of 23 deputy to serve process. A party whose case reа 24 quires immediate attention may be required to wait 25 precious hours or days until local law enforcement 26 personnel become available to serve process.

27 This bill relieves this hardship by allowing 28 sheriffs or their deputies from another county, or 29 constables from another municipality, to serve civil 30 process outside their regular territory in the lim-31 ited situations which would present serious hardships 32 to parties unable to secure prompt service of civil 33 process.
