F. The criminal violation of operating a motor vehicle under the influence of intoxicating liquor or drugs or with an excessive blood-alcohol level, as defined in Title 29, section 1312-B or operating a motor vehicle while the right to operate is revoked, as defined in Title 29, section 2298 and offenses defined in Title 29 as Class B or C crimes.

## STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill makes it clear that Class B and Class C crimes in the Revised Statutes, Titles 12 and 29 are juvenile crimes. Offenses such as failure to aid an injured person and running a roadblock were inadvertently left out of previous changes. Under the current law, a juvenile who commits a murder must be bound over before he can be treated as an adult, whereas a juvenile who fails to report a hunting accident, passes a roadblock, operates after revocation or fails to stop for a police officer can only be treated as an adult. This is contrary to the policy of the Maine Juvenile Code which provides for flexibility in the handling of juvenile cases.
