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Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

That the Legislature finds Purpose. Resolved: that there are 41 statutorily created occupational and professional licensing boards in Maine. Thev license over 50 occupations and professions. The Legislature further finds that proposals to create additional licensing boards are made each year. A study necessary to determine if existing and proposed licensing boards are necessary, if they are the least restrictive and expensive means of protecting and if each has adequate, but not excessive, public authority and financial means to meet its responsibilities; and be it further

Commission; appointment of members. That the Commission on the Evaluation of Occupational and Professional Licensing Boards is established consist of 7 members. One member shall be a member of the Senate and shall be appointed by the President of the Senate. Two members shall be members of Representatives and shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. members shall be appointed by the Governor, 2 of whom shall be public members who have never held occupational or professional licenses from the State. remaining members, one shall be a member of a licensing board within the Department of Business, Occupational and Professional Regulation and the other member shall be a member of a licensing board which is neither in nor attached to that department. In the event of the death or resignation of any member, the replacement member shall be appointed in the same manner as was the original appointment; it further

Duties. Resolved: That the Commission on the Evaluation of Occupational and Professional Licensing Boards shall study and evaluate occupational and professional licensing in this State with respect to the effect of occupational and professional licensing on the citizens of the State, the quality of licensed or certified persons and the supply of licensed or certified persons in regulated occupations and professions. In addition, the commission shall evaluate the degree of efficiency of current licensing and certification procedures and alternatives to the present system; and be it further

Meetings. Resolved: That the commission shall convene for its first meeting at the call of the chairman of the Legislative Council. The first meeting shall be called following the appointment of 4 members to the commission. Four members shall constitute a quorum. No official commission decision may be made unless a quorum is present and voting.

At the first meeting, the commission shall organize and elect a chairman and vice-chairman; and be it further

Expenses. Resolved: That the members of the commission shall serve without compensation, but may be reimbursed for expenses in accordance with the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 379; and be it further

Report. Resolved: That the commission shall report its findings, together with any necessary legislation, to the Second Regular Session of the 112th Legislature, no later than February 3, 1986, at which time the commission shall expire. The report may include any revisions in professional and occupational licenses, procedures of licensing and certification and any other changes it further deems necessary or

Staff assistance. Resolved: That the Legislative Council shall provide staff for the commission; and be it further

Appropriation. Resolved. That the following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this resolve.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve shall take effect when approved.

9 STATEMENT OF FACT

The State has created 41 occupational and professional licensing boards. Twenty are in the Department of Business, Occupational and Professional Regulation, 6 are located elsewhere, but report and budget through it, and the remaining 15 are located elsewhere and report and budget through other departments or are completely autonomous. Each recent session of the Legislature is presented with proposals to create additional licensing boards.

Approximately one of every 6 Maine adults is the holder of an occupational or professional license. Every Maine citizen is affected by the activities of licensing boards.

The study to be conducted by this commission will include an address of the following fundamental questions: Is there a truly public purpose being served by each existing licensing board and is licensing the least restrictive and most economical means of protecting the public? The commission's study will, of necessity, include an address of all secondary questions arising from statutory content or construction, and those related to the rules, administration and operations of licensing boards.

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
