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For purposes of this chapter, significant river segments include the following:

- 10 The Aroostook River Aroostook River. 11 Croix Stream in Masardis to the Masardis and T.10, R.6, W.E.L.S. townline and from the T.10, R.6, 12 13 W.E.L.S. and Oxbow Plantation townline to the Oxbow Plantation and T.9, R.7, W.E.L.S. townline, exclud-14 15 ing segments in T.9, R.5, W.E.L.S.; including its 16 tributary the Big Machias River from the Aroostook 17 River in Ashland to the Ashland and Garfield Plantation and T.11, R.7, W.E.L.S. townlines; 18
 - 1-A. Allagash River. The Allagash River from Gerald Brook in Allagash to the Allagash and T.15, R.11, W.E.L.S. townline;

- 25 §4816. Guidelines for shoreland zoning along signif-26 icant and outstanding river segments
- 27 1. Significant river segments. In addition to quidelines adopted under section 4812, the fol-28 29 lowing guidelines for the protection of the shore-30 lands shall apply along significant river segments 31 identified in section 4811-B. These guidelines are intended to maintain the special values of these par-32 33 ticular river segments by protecting their scenic 34 beauty and undeveloped character.
- A. New principal structures, except for structures related to hydropower facilities, shall have a minimum of lot shore frontage of 150 feet, shall be set back a minimum of 125 feet from the

normal high-water mark of the river and shall be located on a lot which is at least 40,000 square feet in area. The frontage, set-back and lot size requirements of this paragraph shall not apply to lots in existence before July 1, 1985, which meet the frontage, set-back and lot size requirements in existence prior to that date. These structures shall be screened from the river by existing vegetation.

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- B. Developers of new permanent roads, except for those providing access to a structure or facility allowed in the 250-foot zone, shall demonstrate that no reasonable alternative route outside of the zone exists. When roads must be located within the zone, they shall be set back as far as practicable from the normal high-water mark and screened from the river by existing vegatation.
 - C. Developers of new gravel pits shall demonstrate that no reasonable mining site outside of the zone exists. When gravel pits must be located within the zone, they shall be set back as far as practicable from the normal high-water mark and no less than 75 feet and screened from the river by existing vegatation.
- 2. Outstanding river segments. In addition to the guidelines adopted under section 4812, the guidelines described in this section for the protection of the shorelands shall apply along outstanding river segments identified in section 4811-C.
- New principal structures, except for structures related to hydropower facilities, shall have a minimum lot shore frontage of 125 feet, shall be set back a minimum of 100 feet from the normal high-water mark of the river and shall be located on a lot which is at least 30,000 square feet in area. These frontage, set-back and lot size provisions shall not apply either within areas zoned as general development or its equivalent under section 4813, or within areas designated by ordinance as densely developed. The determination of which areas are densely developed shall be based on a finding that, as of July 1, 1985, existing development meets the requirements of section 4811-A, subsection 1. The frontage, set-back and lot

size requirements of this subsection shall not apply to lots in existence before July 1, 1985, which meet the frontage, set-back and lot size requirements in existence prior to that date.

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- Zoning guidelines for shoreland within Maine Land Use Regulation Commission jurisdiction. If the Maine Land Use Regulation Commission adopts special zoning regulations along segments of significant rivers designated in section 4811-B or outstanding rivers designated in section 4811-C, which are located in plantations and municipalities subject to commission jurisdiction, those regulations shall not be more restrictive than the regulations provided by this section for significant and outstanding rivers which are located in municipalities not subject to commission jurisdiction. The commission may adopt more restrictive zoning regulations for segments significant or outstanding rivers located in plantations and municipalities subject to its jurisdiction when those regulations have been approved by the voters of the plantation or municipality.
- Sec. 6. 12 MRSA §4817, as enacted by PL 1983, c. 458, §5, is amended by adding at the end a new paragraph to read:

Each municipality with shorelands along outstanding river segments, as identified in section 4811-C, review the adequacy of the zoning on these shorelands to protect the special values _cited _for these river segments by the Department of Conservation 1982 Maine Rivers Study and for consistency with the guidelines established under section 4816, subsection 2. Prior to December 15, 1986, each such municipality shall certify to the State Planning Office either that its existing zoning for these areas is at least as restrictive as the guidelines established under section 4816, subsection 2, or that it has amended its zoning for this purpose. This certification shall be accompanied by the ordinances and zoning maps covering these areas. Failure to accomplish the purposes of this subsection shall result in adoption of suitable ordinances for these municipalities, as provided for in section 4813.

A subdivision is the division 28 tract or parcel of land into 3 or more lots within any 5-year period, which period begins after Septem-29 22, 1971, whether accomplished by sale, lease, 30 31 development, buildings or otherwise, provided that a 32 division accomplished by devise, condemnation, order 33 of court, gift to a person related to the donor 34 blood, marriage or adoption, unless the intent of 35 such gift is to avoid the objectives of this section, or by transfer of any interest in land to 36 the 37 of land abutting thereon, shall not be considered to 38 create a lot or lots for the purposes of this sec-39 tion.

1 determining whether a tract or parcel of land is 2 divided into 3 or more lots, the first dividing 3 such tract or parcel, unless otherwise exempted here-4 shall be considered to create the first 2 lots 5 and the next dividing of either of said first 2 lots, 6 by whomever accomplished, unless otherwise exempted 7 shall be considered to create a 3rd lot, unherein. 8 less both such dividings are accomplished by a subdi-9 vider who shall have retained one of lots such his own use as a single family residence for a period 10 11 at least 5 years prior to such 2nd dividing. For the purposes of this section, a tract or parcel of land is defined as all contiguous land in the same ownership, provided that lands located on opposite sides of a public or private road shall be considered each a separate tract or parcel of land unless such road was established by the owner of land on both sides thereof.

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A "densely developed area" is defined as any commercial, industrial or compact residential area of 10 or more acres with an existing density of at least one principal structure per 2 acres. A principal structure is defined as any building other than one which is used for purposes wholly incidental or accessory

the use of another building on the same premises.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The purposes of this bill are to enhance the protection of significant and outstanding rivers identified in the rivers bill in 1983 and to provide for treatment of segments of rivers which are located in plantations and municipalities subject to the Maine Land Use Regulation Commission jurisdiction which is equal to that provided for river segments which are in municipalities not subject to the Maine Land Use Regulation Commission jurisdiction.

1 Section 1 makes cross references which are made 2 necessary by this bill.

Section 2 adds the definition of "densely developed," previously in the municipal subdivision law, to the shoreland zoning law for application to outstanding rivers under the provisions of section 4 of the bill.

Section 3 adds segments of rivers which are in plantations and organized towns subject to the Maine Land Use Regulation Commission jurisdiction to the list of significant rivers.

Section 4 relocates the list of outstanding rivers from the municipal subdivision law to the shoreland zoning law; adds segments of rivers which are in plantations and organized towns subject to the Maine Land Use Regulation Commission jurisdiction to the list of outstanding rivers; and deletes segments which overlap with segments designated as significant in section 2.

Section 5 accomplishes the following:

Amends the shoreland zoning restrictions for significant rivers by adding a 150 foot minimum shore lot frontage and a 40,000 square foot minimum lot size;

Adds shoreland zoning restrictions of 125 foot minimum shore lot frontage and 30,000 square foot minimum lot size for outstanding rivers; and

Requires that the Maine Land Use Regulation Commission regulations for segments of significant and outstanding rivers within the Maine Land Use Regulation Commission jurisdiction be no more restrictive than the shoreland zoning standards unless approved by the voters.

Section 6 grants towns with outstanding river segments until December 15, 1986, to certify to the State Planning Office that its shoreland zoning restrictions are at least as restrictive as the statutory standards.

Sections 7, 8 and 9 add segments of the Allagash, Aroostook and St. John Rivers to the rivers listed in the rivers bill for stream alteration law purposes.

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7 8 Sections 10, 11 and 12 repeal the municipal subdivisions provisions of the rivers bill which apply to outstanding river segments. Those segments have been relocated to the shoreland zoning law in section 3.

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
