STATEMENT OF FACT

7 It is estimated that 50,000 spouse abuse assaults
8 are committed in Maine each year. Maine has one of
9 the 2 toughest anti-spouse abuse laws in the nation.
10 Maine arrests and prosecutes only a fraction of 1% of
11 those who violate this law.

12 This bill addresses the obstacles to successful 13 enforcement and prosecution of this law in Maine.

14 Dramatic new evidence confirms that vigorous en-15 forcement of a tough law, if it is part of a coordi-16 nated community response, will significantly reduce the incidence of this crime by preventing new and re-17 18 peat assaults. This bill establishes a Community Re-19 sponse Program, to be coordinated and monitored by the member agencies of the Maine Coalition for Family 20 21 Crisis Services, which will overcome the obstacles to 22 enforcement by creating an aggressive coordinated community response to this crime led by the agencies 23 24 of the criminal justice system.

The Community Response Program is based on a model which has already been demonstrated and proven successful in the State of Minnesota and which has been adapted for Maine.

29 The Community Response Program will demonstrate 30 that:

I. The enforcement of both the civil and crimi nal provisions of Maine's anti-spouse abuse law can
 be significantly and measurably increased, resulting
 in increased numbers of reports, arrests, prosecu tions and convictions for this crime.

36 2. As the result of increased enforcement, the
37 actual incidence of this crime can be significantly
38 and measurably decreased.

1 This bill provides for the implementation of the 2 first stage of the Community Response Program in all 3 regions of the State and will establish the 2nd stage 4 as a pilot project in the 3 regions of the State 5 which have already completed stage one.

6 The first stage of the Community Response Program 7 the provision of a full-time Community Response is 8 Coordinator for each member agency of the coalition. 9 This coordinator provides the initiative, leadership 10 and staff required to identify obstacles to enforce-11 ment on a local and regional level and to develop and 12 implement a coordinated strategy by the criminal jus-13 tice system and other community agencies to overcome 14 them.

As a group, the coordinators will provide the coalition with the initiative, leadership and staff required to identify the statewide obstacles to enforcement and to develop and coordinate a statewide strategy among the criminal justice system and other community agencies to overcome them.

21 The 2nd stage of the Community Response Program 22 is the provision of new, specialized law enforcement 23 services developed by the coalition for both the vic-24 tims of spouse abuse and the agencies of the criminal 25 justice system which can overcome specific obstacles 26 to enforcement which have been identified in stage 27 one.

28 For the victim, these law enforcement services 29 include on-call on-scene victim-witness advocacy from 30 immediate post assault response through all phases of 31 enforcement and prosecution, including short-term and 32 long-term follow up and specialized, structured edu-33 cational services focusing on overcoming the damage 34 of the crime and increasing participation in enforce-35 ment and prosecution.

36 For the criminal justice system, these services 37 include on-call on-scene victim-witness advocacy services to police departments on spouse abuse complaint 38 39 responses; victim-witness advocacy for prosecutors; 40 monitoring, follow-up and perpetrator education and 41 training for probationers; ongoing, specialized 42 training; and on-call consultation and support for 43 all branches of the criminal justice system.

1 Three member agencies of the coalition will use funds from this appropriation to pay for the person-2 3 support necessary to provide these new law nel and 4 enforcement services in pilot jurisdictions within 5 service areas. These agencies are: The Family their 6 Violence Project in Augusta, serving Kennebec and 7 Somerset Counties; the Family Crisis Shelter in Port-8 land, serving Cumberland County; and Caring Unlimited 9 in Saco, serving York County. The 4-county region 10 served by these programs accounts for 50% of the reports of the crime of spouse abuse to state police 11 12 agencies.

13 These 3-member agencies will also use funds from 14 this appropriation to provide training and technical 15 assistance in these law enforcement services to the 16 remaining 6-member agencies of the coalition in an 17 amount sufficient to insure coordination of its 18 statewide program.

19 This bill provides funding to establish 12 paid 20 positions and a minimum of 21 trained and supervised 21 volunteer positions at a cost of \$193,200 in Personal 22 Services and \$56,800 in All Other costs.

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
