Whereas, available resources to pay for these services have been unable to keep pace with this demand; and

Whereas, a more creative use of the Medicaid Program could increase the availability and range of mental health services to children with special needs; and

Whereas, the Commission to Examine the Availability, Quality and Delivery of Services Provided to Children with Special Needs has determined that a number of areas relating to Medicaid reimbursement should be studied in greater depth; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Committee established. Resolved: That the Department of Human Services shall convene an interdepartmental Medicaid Review Committee to develop proposals for certain revisions in Maine's Medicaid Program; and be it further

Duties. Resolved: That the committee shall consider the following areas of concern:

- 1. A proposal to finance services in the most appropriate setting, including, but not limited to, home-based care and counseling through Medicaid reimbursement;
- A proposal for Medicaid reimbursement for alcoholism treatment services provided in rehabilitation setting other than hospitals;
- 33 3. Increased Medicaid reimbursement rates for 34 mental health services;
 - Medicaid reimbursement for mental health services provided by all certified social workers; and

1 5. Medicaid reimbursement for services provided 2 by teams who treat and evaluate special needs chil-3 dren; and be it further

Reports. Resolved: That the Medicaid Review Committee submit a written report to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources no later than January 15, 1986; and be it further

Copies of resolve forwarded. Resolved: That suitable copies of this resolve be forwarded to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources, the Department of Human Services, the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, the Department of Educational and Cultural Services and the Department of Corrections.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve shall take effect when approved.

18 STATEMENT OF FACT

The ability of Maine's social service and mental health agencies to care for troubled children and their families was called into question last year by a Maine Sunday Telegram article that profiled the tragic life of Malcolm Robbins.

To make sure that Maine social service agencies could better handle the Malcolm Robbins of today, State Representative Sharon Benoit and others persuaded the Legislature to establish the Commission to Examine the Availability, Quality and Delivery of Services Provided to Children with Special Needs. Governor Joseph E. Brennan supported the initiative.

The Legislature appointed 31 members, including lawmakers, judges, physicians, classroom and special education teachers, a police chief, social workers, counselors, psychologists and commissioners or representatives from the Department of Corrections, Department of Educational and Cultural Services, Department of Human Services and Department of Mental

38 Health and Mental Retardation to the commission.

In its search for problem areas or gaps in the system, the commission invited comments from parents, educators, child welfare officials and mental health experts. The commission conducted public hearings and invited written recommendations, state agency proposals and professional association critiques.

After more than a year of study, the commission found that many positive changes had been made in Maine's social service delivery system since the years when Malcolm Robbins was a child. The commission also acknowledged that numerous problems continue to hamper crucial services and treatment to children with mental, emotional or behavioral problems.

Of the commission's 29 recommendations, 14 required administrative action by the Department of Corrections, Department of Educational and Cultural Services, Department of Human Services and Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. An additional 7 recommendations are addressed in legislative resolves.

The purpose of this resolve is to establish an interagency committee to review current Medicaid reimbursement policies and to look specifically at expanding Medicaid reimbursement to cover services delivered in alternative settings and services provided by specialized groups of providers. A written report shall be submitted to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources no later than January 15, 1986.

The need to review current Medicaid reimbursement policies is reflected in the report of the Commission to Examine the Availability, Quality and Delivery of Services Provided to Children with Special Needs.

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
