IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-FIVE
AN ACT Concerning the Requirements for Licensing Private Investigators.
Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
Sec. 1. 32 MRSA §8105, sub-§7, as enacted by PL 1981, c. 126, §2, is repealed.
Sec. 2. 32 MRSA §8105, sub-§7-A is enacted to read:
7-A. Experience. Meets at least one of the following criteria:
A. Has been employed for a minimum of one year as an investigative assistant possessing a valid license issued by the commissioner and has passed a firearms examination prescribed by the commissioner;

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This new draft provides an exception to the employment requirement in the licensing of private investigators for persons who have not attended the Maine Criminal Justice Academy, but do meet alternative requirements. A person meets this alternative qualification if he possesses a total of 6 years of education and appropriate work experience.

The person must have a least 2 years of ence working in the field of law in a nonclerical position, or other nonclerical work related to the criminal justice system. For example, 2 years of experience as a parole officer would meet this require-The person must also possess at least 2 years of post-secondary education. Sixty academic credits any accredited junior college, college or university is considered appropriate and sufficient for associate requirement. An degree from vocational-technical institute is also adequate, but only if the degree is in law enforcement. These requirements will help insure that private investigators licensed in Maine will have sufficient background in the legal system and possess sufficient edperform ucation to be able to their knowledgeably and within the bounds of the law. This exception recognizes that police work and attendance at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy are not the only appropriate qualifications for private investigators.

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
