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The first appropriation establishes а funding base for Looking Up, a nonprofit support organization for victims and survivors of incest. Looking Up will serve as the central coordinating agency for a statewide network of community-based support centers. Each regional support center will utilize full-time and part-time and volunteer staff to provide community support groups, a 24-hour-a-day telephone support network and multi-system coordination and to serve as an information and referral source. regional office will operate under the guidance of an advisory board composed of local community members representing survivors of incest as well as a background of social service expertise. In addition, program workers will be incest aware individuals pervised by a professional consulting team.

A central office will coordinate the regional offices, prepare education and prevention publications and coordinate regional and state-wide awareness presentations and challenge-activity workshops.

This program will help meet a growing need for ongoing treatment and assistance in the healing efforts of victims and survivors of incest. According to the Governor's Working Group on Child Abuse and Neglect, the waiting lists for treatment are extensive, with existing services having a capacity for only one of 4 cases identified as being in need.

The 2nd appropriation reflects the findings that the State's 9 existing Homebuilders projects are extremely successful in averting removal of children from their homes and also that there is a significant recent increase in the number of placements in residential programs attributable to incest. None of the existing Homebuilders projects specialize in sexual abuse. Each of the proposed 3 projects will serve 40 to 50 families per year.

The 3rd appropriation is an essential accompaniment to the Homebuilders projects, assuring that necessary long-term treatment from teams of clinicians, through both individual and group work with families,
