23	WATER WELL DRILLERS
24	§9701. Legislative intent
25	The Legislature finds that since more than 90% of
26	Maine's rural population depends on ground water for
27	drinking water, and since more than 10,000 new wells
28	are constructed annually in the State, a record of
29	the geological materials and other conditions encoun-
30 31	tered or information gathered during drilling would
32	be of benefit to the Department of Conservation, Maine Geological Survey, in its mission of identifi-
33	cation and mapping of water and mineral resources.

1 §9702. Definitions

- As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
- 5 <u>1. Commissioner. "Commissioner" means the Com-</u>
 6 <u>missioner of Business, Occupational and Professional</u>
 7 Regulation.
- 8 <u>2. Department. "Department" means the Department</u>
 9 <u>of Business, Occupational and Professional Regula-</u>
 10 tion.
- 11 3. Well. "Well" means any hole drilled by any
 12 method for the purpose of extracting water from below
 13 the ground.
- 4. Well drilling contractor. "Well drilling contractor" means any person, company, firm, partnership or corporation engaged in the business of drilled water well construction.

18 §9703. Exclusions

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- 19 <u>1. Wells other than for water supply. Well</u>
 20 drilling contractors engaged solely in the drilling
 21 of wells used exclusively for the relief of artesian
 22 pressure at hydroelectric projects, or used temporar23 ily for dewatering purposes during construction, or
 24 for use associated with the drilling of oil, gas or
 25 brine wells, are exempt from the registration provi26 sions of section 9704, subsections 1 and 2.
- 2. Private wells. Nothing in this chapter may prevent a person from constructing, enlarging, deepening or otherwise altering a well on property which such a person owns or occupies, which is or will be used as a person's principal residence or seasonal home.
 - 3. Governmental unit. A county, city, village, township or other governmental unit engaged in water well drilling shall be registered as a well drilling contractor, according to section 9704, but shall be exempt from paying the required registration fees if the drilling is done by the governmental unit and the

work is on wells intended for use only by the governmental unit.

- 4. Duplication of well completion reports. Wells for which data reports are already required by any state agency shall be exempt from the reporting requirements of this chapter.
- §9704. Registration of well drilling contractors
- 1. Registration required. No well drilling contractor may engage in the business of constructing water wells within this State, unless registered under this chapter with the Department of Business, Occupational and Professional Regulation. The department shall provide registration forms and otherwise carry out the purposes of this chapter. A contractor so registered shall display in its principal place of business its current registration certificate. A contractor so registered shall also carry in or affix to each drilling rig, actually used in the business, a duplicate copy of its current certificate of registration.
- 2. Fees. The annual registration fee shall be \$25 per well drilling contractor. The fee shall cover, in addition to the registration, one original and one duplicate certificate. The fee for additional duplicate certificates shall be \$5 each. Additional duplicate certificates shall be issued in the number requested by each registrant. All fees received under this chapter by the Department of Business, Occupational and Professional Regulation shall be paid to the Treasurer of State to be used by the department. Any balance of these fees shall not lapse, but shall be carried forward as a continuing account to be expended for the same purposes in the following fiscal years.
 - 3. Expiration and renewal. Registration shall be annual and shall expire on September 1st or at such other time as the commissioner may designate. Renewal notices shall be mailed to registrants at least 30 days prior to the expiration of their registrations.
- 40 4. Well completion reports. Within 45 days after completion of any well or dry hole, or the enlarging

- 1 or deepening of an existing well, a registered well 2 drilling contractor shall submit to the Maine Geolog-3 ical Survey a report, on forms designed by the Maine 4 Geological Survey and provided by the department. The 5 report shall contain information as may be required 6 by the Maine Geological Survey, including, but not 7 limited to, location, construction and ownership of 8 the well, materials encountered and well yield.
- The Maine Geological Survey may request additional information pertaining to collecting of scientific data related to natural resources.
- 5. Violation. Any well drilling contractor who engages or offers to engage in the drilling of water wells without having registered with the Department of Business, Occupational and Professional Regulation or who has not submitted well completion reports on a timely basis as required by this chapter shall be in violation of this chapter.
- 19 §9705. Compliance with other laws and rules
- Notwithstanding the provisions set forth in this chapter, all wells are to be constructed and maintained in accordance with all other laws and rules in effect.
- 24 §9706. Penalties
- Any person, company, firm, partnership or corporation, which willfully violates any standard or provision of this chapter, commits a civil violation for
 which a forfeiture of not more than \$500 may be adjudged. In addition to other civil remedies, the
 court may revoke or suspend any registration or issue
 an injunction.

 Drilled wells supply an ever-increasing number of individual homes, municipalities and commercial establishments with high quality water. The purpose of this bill is to secure ground water and geological information for the direct use of the Maine Geological Survey in its programs of investigation throughout the State and indirect use of numerous governmental agencies, groups and individuals involved with the use and protection of ground water and related natural resources. The bill does not include registration of contractors who construct dug wells, nor does it provide for regulation of water well construction standards. The bill is a recommendation of the Ground Water Policy Review Committee.

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
