18 19 20 21	Resolve, Authorizing Continued Study of Information Processing in Social Service Agencies.
22 23 24 25	Emergency Preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
26 27 28 29	Whereas, a study to examine ways in which the in- formation processing systems of income supplementa- tion and social service agencies has reached the crucial stage of implementation; and
30 31 32	Whereas, successful implementation of the recom- mendations of the study requires further legislative and public oversight; and
33 34 35	Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following

legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

4 Computer based information processing; report. 5 Resolved: That the Department of Human Services, the 6 Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, 7 the Division of Community Services and Central Com-8 puter Services shall continue their efforts to fur-9 ther streamline computer-based information processing 10 based on the recommendations of the study mandated by Resolves 1983, chapter 41. Not later than December 11 12 31. 1985, these state agencies shall report to the 13 Legislature on their progress; and be it further

14 Study; recommendations. Resolved: That a Joint 15 Select Committee on Interagency Information Process-16 ing shall advise the Executive and Legislative branches of State Government on the subject matter of 17 18 resolve with the cooperation of the 4 state this 19 agencies. The committee shall consist of 7 members, 20 including 2 Legislators, appointed jointly by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House 21 22 Representatives; 3 members, each of whom shall be of 23 a member of an advisory board or a consumer of ser-24 vices familiar with the operations of the state agen-25 cies, with the 2 commissioners and the Director of Community Services each appointing one member, who 26 27 shall not be an employee of the department or the di-28 vision; and 2 members appointed by the chairman of the Human Services Council, who shall be members of 29 30 the council, council staff or individuals from the 31 private sector who shall be knowledgeable in the sci-32 ence and administration of data processing in commu-33 nity service agencies. Members shall not be vendors 34 or representatives of vendors of data processing equipment, supplies or services. The chairman of the 35 36 committee shall be designated jointly by the chairmen 37 of the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources. 38 The joint select committee shall meet at least once 39 every 2 months to advise on the implementation of 40 study recommendations; and be it further

41 Appropriation. Resolved: That there is appro-42 priated from the General Fund a sum of \$2,000 to car-43 ry out the purposes of this resolve. These funds 44 shall be used to pay a per diem to the commission 1 members, including Legislators when the Legislature 2 is not in session, at the same rate as that paid to 3 Legislators; to pay the actual travel, meal and lodg-4 ing expenses of the commission members; and to pay 5 other actual expenses of the commission.

6 **Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited 7 in the preamble, this resolve shall take effect when 8 approved.

9 STATEMENT OF FACT

10 The purpose of this resolve is to continue the 11 effort begun in the 111th Legislature to coordinate 12 and streamline the information processing systems in 13 the State's social service agencies in order to im-14 prove efficiency and the quality of service to the 15 clients of these agencies.

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
