The Governor shall designate one of the public members as chairman; and be it further

- Subject of the Study. Resolved: That the commission shall investigate and study all facets of State Government competition with the private sector including, but not limited to, the following:
- 1. The extent to which the State provides goods and services for its own use, and the number of state employees involved, which could also be obtained from the private sector;
 - 2. The extent to which the State provides goods and services to the public, and the number of state employees involved, which are also to be provided by the private sector;
- 20 3. The estimated dollar value of goods and ser-21 vices provided by the State to its own agencies or 22 the public in competition with the private sector;
 - 4. The extent to which state procurement policies and procedures discourage participation by small businesses and ways in which those policies and procedures can be reformed; and
 - 5. Such other matters as the commission deems appropriate in providing to the Legislature a full and accurate picture of the ways in which state agencies compete with the private sector in the provision of goods and services to agencies and the public.
- 32 The commission shall seek, to the maximum ways in which government 33 practicable, to recommend can contract out and otherwise utilize the private 34 35 sector for the provision of goods and services at 36 less cost and more benefit to the State and taxpayers 37 than if the goods and services were produced by state agencies: and be it further 38

Report on findings and recommendations. Resolved:
That the commission shall complete its study and report its findings and recommendations and any necessary implementing legislation by January 1, 1987. This report shall address each of the matters set forth in this resolve; and be it further

Compensation. Resolved: That all members of the commission who are not state employees shall serve without compensation.

10 STATEMENT OF FACT

 This resolve establishes a Study Commission to investigate the ways in which state agencies compete with the private sector in the provision of goods and services to the State and to the public. The competition is not the proper function of government and often is not a prudent use of taxpayer money.

Relying on the private sector for goods and services can not only reduce the cost of State Government, it can stimulate the economy and result in a better product or service than would be available from the State.

The commission is directed to submit its findings and report by January 1, 1987.
