Whereas, unless this legislation is enacted as emergency legislation, it will not take effect before the summer begins; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore.

- Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
- 12 Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §5151, as repealed and replaced 13 by PL 1985 c. 451, §1, is amended to read:

14 §5151. Maine Conservation Corps Program

There is created in the Department of Conservation the Maine Conservation Corps to provide job training, conservation education and work opportunities for the unempleyed and to improve public property for the increased use and enjoyment of the public economically disadvantaged, to improve public property for the increased use and enjoyment of the public and to assist nonprofit organizations with projects that serve a valid public purpose and are consistent with this subchapter.

25 Sec. 2. 12 MRSA §5152, as repealed and replaced by PL 1985, c. 451, §1, is amended to read:

27 §5152. Participants

 Participants in the Maine Conservation Corps shall be unempleyed economically disadvantaged as defined by the United States Job Training Partnership Act, subchapter II, Public Law 97-300. No one may be eligible if he has left employment or school for the purpose of participating in this program. Corps members may be jointly enrolled in any state or local job training program or human resource development program.

37 Sec. 3. 12 MRSA §5153 sub-§§2 and 3, as enacted by PL 1985, c. 451, §1, are amended to read:

- 2. Eligible sponsors. All projects must be un-1 dertaken and operated under the sponsorship and coop-2 3 of public landowning agencies a public eration 4 landowning agency or a nonprofit organization. Spon-5 soring public agencies or organizations shall con-6 tribute to projects by, at a minimum, providing tools, supplies, equipment and technical supervision 7 8 and plans necessary for project completion.
- 9 3. Additional criteria. Projects must be of lasting and worthwhile significance to the people of the State or otherwise serve a valid public purpose, provide meaningful work experience to the enrollees and be labor intensive.

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- Projects to be carried out by the Maine Conservation Corps shall be limited to projects on publicly owned lands or, if not on public lands, under the sponsorship and supervision of a nonprofit organization.
- 22 Sec. 5. 12 MRSA §5155, 2nd ¶, as enacted by PL 23 1985, c. 451, §1, is amended to read:
 - The director shall work with other agencies and organizations to design the program to provide maximum work opportunities, job skills training and, improvements to publicly owned property and assistance with projects conducted by nonprofit organizations.
- Sec. 6. 12 MRSA §5157 is enacted to read:
- 30 §5157. Prohibition against displacement of other em-31 ployees or involvement in labor dispute

The assignment of corps members shall not result in the displacement of existing employees of the sponsor, including any employees who have been temporarily laid off by the sponsor. For purposes of this section, the term "displacement" means both total and partial displacement, including a reduction in the number of hours, wages or other benefits of employment.

Sec. 7. Appropriation. The following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act.

Maine Conservation Corps Personal Services Provides funds to expand the Maine Conservation Corps Program for em-ploying and training economically disadvan-Maine youth on taged conservation-related projects.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect when approved.

19 STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill provides funds to enable 100 additional economically disadvantaged young people to be employed on conservation-related projects throughout the State in 1986. It also permits corps members to be placed with nonprofit organizations on projects that serve a valid public purpose and are otherwise consistent with the Maine Conservation Corps Act. All of the requested funds will be used to create new slots for corps members and project team leaders. No additional administrative funds have been requested nor are they necessary to carry out the purpose of this Act.

Since its inception in 1983, corps members have worked on projects such as wildlife habitat management, timber stand improvement, erosion control, clam bed management and campsite and picnic area development.

The value and success of these projects, accom-2 plished with modest state dollars combined with fed-3 eral JTPA funds, have been demonstrated in over 30 4 areas of the State. The demand for corps projects by municipalities, agencies and organizations far exceeds the Maine Conservation Corps' capacity to respond. These additional funds will enable the Maine 5 6 7 Conservation Corps to better respond to that demand, as well as create meaningful employment opportunities 8 9 10 for disadvantaged young people.

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
