14 15 16	IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-SIX
17 18 19	AN ACT to Revise the Statutes Pertaining to Use and Sale of Live Fish as Bait.
20 21	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
22 23	Sec. 1. 12 MRSA $97001$ , sub- $991-A$ and 1-B are enacted to read:
24 25	1-A. Baitfish. "Baitfish" means only those spe- cies in the following list:
26	A. Lake chub, (Couesius plumbeus);
27	B. Silvery minnow, (Hybognathus nuchalis);
28	C. Golden shiner, (Notemigonus chrysoleucas);
29	D. Emerald shiner, (Notropis atherinoides);
30	E. Bridled shiner, (Notropis bifrenatus);

1	F. Common shiner, (Notropis cornutus);
2	G. Blacknose shine; (Notropis heterolepis);
3	H. Spottail shiner, (Notropis hudsonius);
4	I. Northern redbelly dace, (Phoxinus eos);

7	L. Blacknose dace, (Rhinichthys atratulus);

17 18 19 20	1-B. Baitfish trap. "Baitfish trap" means a de- vice used to take baitfish, fitted with rigid en- trance or exit holes no larger than 1 1/2 inches in breadth and a volume no greater than 50 cubic feet.
21 22	Sec. 2. 12 MRSA §7001, sub-§33-A is enacted to read:
23 24 25 26 27	33-A. Seine. "Seine" means an ordinary commercial-type minnow seine, not to exceed 8 feet in depth by 150 feet in length, used vertically to en- close baitfish when its ends are brought together or drawn ashore.

4	<u>§7171.</u> Baitfish dealer's license
5 6 7	1. Issuance. The commissioner may issue a baitfish dealer's license to any person, permitting that person to:
8 9 10	A. Take, possess or transport live baitfish, as defined in section 7001, subsection 1-A, for resale; and
11	B. Sell or offer to sell live baitfish.
12	2. Fee. The fee for a baitfish dealer's license
13	shall be \$20 for calendar year 1986, \$21 for calendar
14	year 1987 and every calendar year thereafter.
15	3. Restrictions. The following restrictions ap-
16	ply to the taking or selling of baitfish.
17	A. If a person sells live baitfish in more than
18	one wholesale or retail outlet, he must obtain a
19	separate license for each location.
20	B. A person engaged in taking live baitfish for
21	resale must hold a current baitfish dealer's li-
22	cense which shall be exhibited upon request to
23	any agent of the commissioner.
24	C. The holder of a baitfish dealer's license may
25	take baitfish by use of a seine as defined in

3	B. Sell or offer to sell live smelts.
4	2. Fee. The fee for a live smelt dealer's li-
5	cense shall be \$65 for calendar year 1986, \$66 for
6	calendar year 1987 and each year thereafter.
7	3. Restrictions. The following restrictions ap-
8	ply to the selling, taking, possession or transporta-
9	tion of live smelts.
10	A. If a person sells live smelts in more than
11	one wholesale or retail outlet, he must obtain a
12	separate license for each location.
13	B. A person engaged in taking or transporting
14	live smelts for resale must hold a current live
15	smelt dealer's license which shall be exhibited
16	upon request to any agent of the commissioner.
17	C. The holder of a live smelt dealer's license
18	may take live smelts with a dipnet, dropnet or
19	hook and line at any time from specific inland
20	waters designated by the commissioner.
21	D. The holder of a live smelt dealer's license
22	may take up to 8 quarts of smelts within any
23	24-hour period.

The holder of a live smelt dealer's license may possess at the address on the smelt dealer's license or transport more than 8 quarts of live smelts at any time, provided that the smelts were acquired in a lawful manner. As evidence of law- ful possession, the receipted invoice, bill of lading, bill of sale or other satisfactory evi- dence shall be presented upon request to any agent of the commissioner.
33	Each container used to transport live smelts must
34	be labeled with the vords "live smelts" and must
35	be accompanied with written documentation identi-
36	fying both the source and destination of smelts.

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1 §7173. Permit to take baitfish

2 1. Issuance. Whenever any inland waters are closed to fishing, the commissioner may issue permits 3 to take minnews baitfish for bait purposes from those 4 5 waters. 6 Sec. 6. 12 MRSA §7606, as enacted by PL 1979, c. 7 420, §1, is repealed and the following enacted in its 8 place: 9 §7606. Selling, using or possessing baitfish 1. Selling, using or possessing illegal baitfish. A person is guilty, except as provided in 10 11 12 section 7630, subsection 1, of selling, using or possessing illegal baitfish if he sells, offers for sale, uses or possesses for use as bait for fishing 13 14 15 any species of fish not listed in section 7001, sub-16 section 1-A. 17 2. Failure to label baitfish traps or baitfish 18 holding boxes. 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## STATEMENT OF FACT

5 Many individuals derive much of their income by 6 selling live baitfish and smelts to fishermen for use 7 as bait in taking sport fish during both the open wa-8 ter and ice fishing seasons. The current laws dealing 9 with live bait have been on the books for many years 10 and are no longer adequate to ensure proper manage-11 ment and protection of this very important resource.

12 The purpose of this bill is to clarify, update 13 and ensure enforceability of the laws which pertain 14 to the taking, possessing and selling of live 15 baitfish and live smelts.

Sections 1 and 2 provide definitions of the terms "baitfish", "baitfish trap" and "seine."

18 Section 3 establishes a new baitfish dealer's li-19 cense which allows a person to take for resale and 20 sell live baitfish. The new license is similar to the current bait dealer's license and the fee is exactly 21 22 the same. This revision makes it clear that each live 23 baitfish outlet must be licensed separately and that 24 all those who participate in taking baitfish for re-25 sale must be licensed.

26 A baitfish dealer's license will no longer allow 27 the taking of live smelts for resale.

28 Persons who take live baitfish for their own use 29 are not affected.

30 Section 4 establishes a new live smelt dealer's 31 license which allows a person to take for resale and 32 sell live smelts. The new license is similar to the current smelt dealer's license and the fee is exactly 33 34 the same. This revision makes it clear that each live 35 smelt outlet must be licensed separately and that all 36 those who participate in taking live smelts for re-37 sale must be licensed.

1 A live smelt dealer's license allows the taking 2 of 8 quarts of smelts in any 24-hour period rather 3 than daily. The burden is on the dealer to provide 4 safisfactory evidence that possession of smelts in 5 excess of those taken by him within the 24-hour peri-6 od were acquired lawfully.

7 Persons who take live smelts for their own use 8 are not affected.

9 Section 5 changes the word "minnow" to 10 "baitfish."

Section 6 establishes prohibited acts for the sale or use of illegal baitfish and for failure to properly label baitfish traps and baitfish holding boxes.

15 Section 7 makes it clear that baitfish may be 16 taken without a permit from waters which are open to 17 fishing. Permits to take baitfish, both for resale 18 and for personal use, are required during periods 19 when waters are closed to fishing.

20 Section 8 makes it clear that baitfish may be 21 taken by methods not allowed in taking other inland 22 fish species.

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
