8 STATEMENT OF FACT

It is the intent of this bill to create a Rape Crisis Center, based in Augusta, that will serve the Towns of Augusta, Hallowell, Manchester, Mount Vernon, Rome, Farmingdale, West Gardiner, Windsor, Palermo, Somerville and Washington.

In a review of the territories covered by the 8 existing Rape Crisis Centers, it was revealed that centers were not providing services to citizens of Augusta, Hallowell, Manchester, Mount Vernon, Rome, Farmingdale, West Gardiner, Windsor, Palermo, Somerville or Washington.

If the statistics for the remainder of the State prove consistent with the capital area, for each rape reported to the police, 6 are reported to rape crisis centers. Using that formula, 54 rapes occurred in this region over the last 10 months.

Specially trained sexual assault counselors provide direct assistance to rape and incest victims via 24-hour hotlines, crisis intervention counselling, information and support throughout the medical, law enforcement and court processes. In addition, the rape crisis programs are all nonprofit organizations; keep records of services provided; raise funds from a variety of sources, state, private and local. They all utilize volunteers, whose in-kind services are worth an average of \$250,000 per year. Program directors coordinate services, both on a statewide level, by means of a coalition, and on a local level, by networking with other regional agencies.

An Augusta based Rape Crisis Center will not only provide treatment for the victim of sexual assault,

1	but will also provide the community with education on
2	rape prevention. In other communities, counselors are
3	asked to train a variety of professionals in hospi-
4	tals, schools, community organizations and even local
5	and state law enforcement personnel.

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
