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## 3 STATEMENT OF FACT

The Welfare Employment, Education and Training Program provides employment and training opportunities to Aid to Families with Dependant Children recipients seeking to become self-sufficient. Welfare Employment, Education and Training Program, initiated in 1982, has attracted national attention innovative and successful model for assisting an Aid to Families with Dependant Children recipients move from welfare to work. Since its inception, the Welfare Employment, Education and Training Program has provided 2,700 Aid to Families with Dependant Children parents with education and training opportunities and 4,500 parents enrolled in the program have found employment. These efforts have resulted in an estimated 11.5 million dollars in savings in Aid to Families with Dependant Children payments. The sucof the program may also be measured by the fact that more than 2 1/2 times more Aid to Families with Dependant Children recipients volunteer for the Welfare Employment, Education and Training Program did for its predecessor, the Work Incentive Program.

The demand for employment and training services is now much greater than the program can provide. The future success of the Welfare Employment, Education and Training Program in enabling Aid to Families with Dependant Children recipients to move from welfare to work depends on the availability of program funds for client services. Decreased federal dollars and increased personnel and operating costs have effectively reduced the number of persons that can receive services. This bill provides funds to maintain those services at current levels.

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
