17 18 19 20	AN ACT to Clarify the Law Relating to Authorization by Divorced Parents for the Exhumation of the Body of a Child.
21 22	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
23	22 MRSA §2843, sub-§2-A is enacted to read:
24 25 26 27 28 29 30	2-A. Removal of body of minor; consent of divorced parents. No court may order or allow the disinterment or removal of the body of any minor under subsection 2, nor may any municipal clerk issue a permit for the disinterment or removal of such a body under subsection 2, when the surviving parents of that minor are divorced, unless:
31 32 33 34 35	A. Seven days prior to the issuance of such an order or permit, written notice of the request for such an order or permit is sent to the last known address of any surviving parent not joining in the request; and

1 2 3	B. The court or clerk has not received any communication from any such parent objecting to the disinterment or removal of the body.
4 5 6	If any surviving parent objects to the request, a court of competent jurisdiction must determine whether to allow the disinterment or removal.
7 8 9 10 11	Notwithstanding this subsection, a court or clerk may authorize disinterment or removal if a licensed physician or coroner certifies that immediate disinterment or removal of the body is necessary for public health or safety or to the furtherance of any criminal investigation.
13	STATEMENT OF FACT
14 15 16	The intent of this bill is to clear up difficulties in exhuming the body of a child where authorization must be given by divorced parents.
