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Each year there are between 600 and 700 psychiatric hospital admissions from the tri-county, area; of these, 150 to 200 are admissions the Augusta Mental Health Institute. Some of these hospitalizations and other serious life disruptions may be effectively adverted with the addition of a mobile, outreach-oriented, 24-hour, 7 days a week crisis stabilization service. These funds provide 5 trained crisis workers who will be available to respond, whenever and wherever needed, to people with mental illness who are experiencing increased symptoms resulting in behavior that put them at risk of dislocation or hospitalization. These workers have immediate access to respite housing and the use of trained home health aides to provide support and supervision to the person in crisis.

It is estimated that this program, when fully operational, will result in about 150 respite housing admissions each year and about 400 other types of crisis stabilization service interventions for the same period.

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
