## STATEMENT OF FACT

There are approximately 50 persons residing at any one time in either the Augusta Mental Health Institute or the Bangor Mental Health Institute who require services for the mentally retarded. These clients may be diagnosed as both mentally ill and mentally retarded. At present, mentally retarded persons residing in Pineland Hospital receive the protection of the judicial certification and judicial commitment procedures, which are designed to guarantee their ability to be placed in the least restrictive environment necessary.

These procedures do not apply to those persons who are residing at the state mental health institutions. This bill makes those protected procedures applicable to them.
