The purpose of this bill is to enact into law an intent expressed in the State Government Committee Report on Boards and Commissions, dated December, 1984, and to provide the compensation for 2 boards. The State Government Committee Report expressed the intent that no member of a board should be deemed eligible for state retirement benefits. Since the purpose of serving on a board is to provide talent and a public service, the board member should not be entitled to state retirement benefits.

This bill also provides a per diem of \$35 to members of the State Board of Education and the Board of Trustees of the Maine Vocational-technical Institutes. These boards have prodigious workloads and a significant impact on the State. The board members have displayed a very conscientious attitude in carrying out their duties and responsibilities to these boards for which they currently receive no remuneration except expenses.

This bill also increases the compensation of members of the Health Care Finance Commission from \$100 to \$150 per day.

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
