23 24 25	Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legis- lature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
26 27 28	Whereas, the Town of Hope has acquired through the tax-lien foreclosure process property formerly owned by the Union Chemical Company, Inc.; and
29 30 31	Whereas, this property, because of operations conducted by its former owner, poses a threat of environmental damage; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Immunity from liability. Any other law notwithstanding, the municipality of Hope shall have complete immunity from any and all claims arising out of or related to its ownership, maintenance or use of real and personal property located in the municipality of Hope and acquired by the municipality through the tax-lien foreclosure process from the Union Chemical Corporation, Incorporated.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect when approved.

STATEMENT OF FACT

Through the tax-lien foreclosure process, the Town of Hope has acquired property owned by Union Chemical Company, Incorporated. This property has been used as a site of manufacture of chemicals and as a hazardous waste dump. The Department of Environmental Protection currently is involved in the cleanup of this dump site. Municipal officers of the Town of Hope are greatly concerned by unforeseen and possibly limitless liability that may be incurred due to the nature of the dump and the danger of pollutants leaching into groundwater.

This bill grants complete immunity to the Town of Hope with respect to this property. In particular, this bill exempts the Town of Hope from liability for sudden and accidental discharge, dispersal, release or escape of pollutants into the land, atmosphere or water as well as for any slow leaching of pollutants. This bill provides immunity for the Town of Hope in

areas where it might otherwise be liable under the
Maine Tort Claims Act and under any other laws, but
specifically limits this immunity to property formerly owned by the Union Chemical Company, Incorporated
and acquired by tax-lien foreclosure.

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
