18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25	The intent of this new draft is to reduce by 99% the fee on hazardous materials proposed in the original bill. This new draft also lowers the cap on the Maine Hazardous Waste Fund from \$600,000 to \$400,000 in order to further limit the fee burden on Maine industry. An exemption is provided for drinking water and municipal waste treatment uses of the hazardous materials listed.

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26 27 28 The new draft preserves the intent of the original bill to improve the state's ability to respond to emergency spills of hazardous wastes and materials.
