| | ne commissioner shall establish a program of research within the Bureau of Marine Sci- |

ences. The purpose of this program will be to develop reliable scientific information for use in management decisions.

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- 1. Research. The lobster research program shall include investigation of lobster population dynamics, reproductive behavior and migration patterns. Specific attention shall be given to evaluating the impacts of the State's v-notch program on the reproductive potential of lobster stocks.
- 2. Policy investigations. The commissioner shall develop in the lobster research program the capacity to systematically analyze the effects of conservation and management options. The analysis includes both the biological and economic components of the fishery. Options for policy analysis include, without limitation, changes in the lobster measures, seasons, limitations on effort and limitations on entry to the fishery. Analysis of these options shall be conducted cooperatively with the industry and the Lobster Advisory Council.
- 3. Data collection. The commissioner shall continue the lobster fisheries data collection project undertaken by the department since 1967. Continuity of data collection shall be ensured.
- 4. Cooperation. The commissioner shall cooperatively develop and coordinate the lobster research program with the University of Maine and the lobster industry.
 - 5. Report. The commissioner shall prepare an annual report to the Legislature setting out the accomplishments of the previous year and an updated, 5-year research plan for future activities with proposed budget requirements. The report shall be reviewed by the Lobster Advisory Council prior to submission to the Legislature. The report shall be submitted to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over marine resources on or before January 1st of each year.
 - 6. Funds. All federal and state funds obtained and used by the department for lobster research shall be utilized to achieve the objectives of this subchapter.

- Sec. 2. 12 §6431, sub-§1, as enacted by PL 1977, c. 661, §5, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:
- 1. Minimum and maximum length. It is unlawful to buy, sell, give away, transport, ship or possess any lobster which is less than the minimum size established by this subsection or more than 5 inches in length, as determined by the state double gauge lobster measure. The minimum size shall be as follows.
- 10 A. Effective January 1, 1988, the minimum size shall be 3 7/32 inches.
- 12 B. Effective January 1, 1990, the minimum size shall be 3 8/32 inches.

Sec. 6. Effective date. Sections 2 to 5 shall become effective when the New England Fisheries Management Council has amended the American Lobster Fishery Management Plan and the United States Secretary of Commerce has promulgated the appropriate rules to implement a schedule of increases in the minimum legal lobster size at least as restrictive as that described in section 2 and to prohibit the possession of v-notched lobsters.

 Sections 2 to 5 shall become effective when the appropriate regulatory action by the United States Secretary of Commerce has the force of law in all states or when federal legislation accomplishes the same purpose.

Sections 2 to 5 shall become effective when the Attorney General certifies that the prerequisite actions specified by this section have occurred.

Sec. 7. Repeal. Sections 2 to 5 of this Act are repealed on January 1, 1988, if the conditions of section 6 have not been met.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This new draft establishes, by law, a lobster research and data collection program to ensure continuity of the department's efforts in this area. The research program also requires that specific attention be paid to areas not previously investigated such as the value of the v-notch program.

This new draft also proposes a schedule of gradual, small increases in the minimum lobster measure conditional on acceptance by the New England Fisheries Management Council and the Federal Government of the v-notch program and similar increases in the minimum measure.

The proposed increases will not be effective until a comparable national minimum size is established along with a comprehensive prohibition on the possession of v-notched lobsters.

There is growing support among lobstermen throughout New England for gradual increases in the minimum measure in order to provide a buffer of safety to the lobster stocks. The value of this buffer is discussed in the recent Botsford report to the Joint Standing Committee on Marine Resources. Maine lobstermen and industry organizations in the State feel that this proposal may be the State's best chance to attain broader acceptance of the v-notch program. If other states or the Federal Government move ahead with a measure increase, this opportunity would be lost.

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
