- Sec. 2. 5 MRSA §12003-A, sub-§§7, 8 and 9 are enacted to read:
 - 7. Prohibition of retirement benefits. No member of a board, as defined in this chapter, may be deemed eligible for state retirement and retirement benefits provided to classified and unclassified state employees pursuant to chapter 101. Any state employee member of a board shall be eligible for state retirement and retirement benefits by virtue of employment by the State and not as the result of membership of any board.
 - No person may accumulate time or credit for any state retirement or retirement benefits for time served on a board or commission.
 - 8. Accounting procedure. Every board defined in section 12004 shall have separate accounting activities as required and in the form prescribed by the Commissioner of Finance and Administration. These accounting procedures shall show the income, expenses and expenditures of the board as separate from the income and expenditures of the department with which the board is associated or a part and separate from the expenditures of the staff associated with or employed by the board. The expenses of the board to be shown in the activity accounts, at a minimum, shall include any per diem or rate of compensation paid to the board members, travel expenses in state and out of state of board members and any other expenses deemed necessary or reasonable by the commissioner.
 - 9. Compensation limited to one board meeting a day. No member of a board eligible for compensation for attendance at meetings, hearings or official business of the board may be compensated or reimbursed for expenses for more than one meeting, hearing or official board business per day. No person who is a member of more than one board may be compensated or reimbursed for expenses for attendance at

2 1983, c. 812, §39, is amended to read:

Every board established by this chapter, except these elassified as eccupational and professional licensing boards in section 12004, subsection 1, and which are within or affiliated with the Department of Business, Occupational and Professional Regulation, shall be required to submit an annual report to the Secretary of State, on forms provided by the Secretary of State. This report shall be submitted no later than December 15th of each calendar year and shall include the information required by this section and any other information deemed necessary by the Secretary of State to fulfill the purposes of this chapter:

- Sec. 6. 5 MRSA §12006, sub-§1 is enacted to
 read:
- l. Notice of failure to report. The Commissioner of Finance and Administration shall send notice by certified mail to any board that has failed to report pursuant to section 12005. If the board fails to file the report within 30 days from the date the notice is sent, the board shall be deemed to be unwilling to disclose information vital to the public interest and necessary to determine whether the board serves the public health, safety or welfare.
 - A. Any board which fails to respond as provided in this subsection shall be declared as failing to serve a public purpose and any actions taken by the board shall be null and void following the 30-day period defined in this subsection.
 - B. In the event that the board files a report as required in section 12005 anytime within the 5-month period following the date that the board's actions become null and void, as defined in paragraph A, the Commissioner of Finance and Administration shall review the report to determine whether the board is in compliance with the reporting requirement. If the board is in compliance, its subsequent actions shall be deemed effective. Any board which reports that the board held no meetings shall be considered in compliance with section 12005.

1 C. If the board fails to report within 6 months 2 from the reporting date specified in section 3 12005, the board shall be deemed unwilling to fulfill a public purpose and shall be abolished. 4 5 The Commissioner of Finance and Administration 6 shall notify the board in writing that its authority is repealed and the board is abolished. 7 8 The commissioner shall notify the legislative committee having jurisdiction over State Govern-9 10 ment that the board is abolished.

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- Sec. 7. Board of Commissions established is established the Board of Commissions to consist of 6 persons, 2 of whom shall be appointed by the Governor. The board shall consist of the Commissioner of nor. Finance and Administration; one person from the Office of the Governor, who is knowledgeable about and experienced with appointments to boards; the Deputy Secretary of State in charge of Public Administration; 2 members of the Joint standing Committee on State Government, one of whom shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives and one whom shall be appointed by the President of the Senate; and one member of the Joint Standing Committee on Audit and Program Review appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The Governor shall appoint the chairman.
- 1. Compensation. Legislative members of the board shall be the only board members to receive compensation which shall be the legislative per diem rate, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 12002. Legislators shall not be paid a per diem when they attend meetings of the board while the Legislature is in session or in conjunction with serving on another board for which they receive compensation.
 - A. Other members of the board shall be reimbursed for expenses as provided in Title 5, chapter 379.

income and expenses of boards from the income and expenses of departments with which they are associated and from the expenses and expenditures employed by or made available to the boards. This accounting requirement will provide the income and expenditures for roughly 125 boards for which there are currently no account activities. As a result, the State will have a much clearer picture of the costs of boards and commissions to State Government.

This new draft limits compensation and reimbursement of expenses of any board member to compensation and expense reimbursement for the activities of one board meeting or hearing per day. There are currently cases in which persons who are members of more than one board collect compensation and expenses for 2 or more meetings or hearings a day when the boards on which they serve meet on the same day.

In addition to these provisions, the new draft establishes the legislative per diem rate as the rate of compensation for the State Board of Education, the Board of Trustees of the Maine Vocational-Technical Institutes and the Board of Trustees of the University of Maine. These boards have very substantial work loads and the members currently serve faithfully in a very conscientious manner for no compensation whatsoever.

This new draft also makes boards and commissions more accountable by:

- Requiring professional and occupational licensing boards to file the annual report with the Secretary of State that is required of other boards; and
 - 2. Establishing disclosure of board activities as essential to the public health, safety and welfare for which failure to comply renders the board's prospective acts null and void.

This new draft also authorizes informal advisory boards and other boards excluded by definition in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 379, to be reimbursed for expenses, including meals, to the extent that the budgets of state agencies with which

they are associated have sufficient funds to pay these expenses. Members of some of these boards travel long distances for no compensation and contribute their talents to State Government. Currently, they are required to pay their own expenses including lunch, coffee etc.
