The Com- mission to Examine the Availability, Quality and De- livery of Services Provided to Children with Special Needs, as established by Title 5, section 12004, sub- section 10, shall consist of 31 members representing different areas of the State appointed as follows.
15 16 17 18 19 20	A. The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint 3 members of the House of Represen- tatives, one each from the joint standing commit- tees of the Legislature having jurisdiction over human resources, judiciary and appropriations and financial affairs.

1 ensure that Maine social service agencies To 2 could better handle the Malcolm Robbins' of today, 3 the 111th Legislature established the Maine Commis-4 sion to Examine the Availability, Quality and Deliv-5 ery of Services Provided to Children with Special 6 Needs. The commission accomplished many of its ex-7 plicit tasks during the next 2 years and published a 8 report of its findings in January 1985.

9 Commission members met again during the fall of 10 1985 to review the progress made by the 4 major 11 youth-serving departments in addressing its recommen-12 dations. It was clear that the commission provided 13 the impetus for many positive changes in the service 14 delivery system for children with special needs.

15 No joint special or standing committee on chil-16 dren currently exists in Maine, yet the Legislature 17 faces an increasing number of complex issues relating 18 to children and families each year. This bill estab-19 lishes on a permanent basis a broad-based, 20 multidisciplinary commission on children with special 21 needs to ensure that progress continues to be made in 22 addressing problems in the service delivery system 23 for children with special needs.

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
